21	WHEREAS, between 2018 and 2035, King County is projected to receive
22	approximately three hundred fifteen million dollars, and
23	WHEREAS, the proceeds are required by RCW 43.79.520 "for educational
24	services to improve educational outcomes in early learning, K-12, and higher education
25	including, but not limited to, for youths that are low-income, homeless, or in foster care,
26	or other vulnerable populations," and
27	WHEREAS, to the greatest extent practicable, the expenditures of the county
28	must follow the requirements of the Sound Transit subarea equity policy, and
29	WHEREAS, the proceeds may only be spent after the Washington state
30	Legislature appropriates them, and
31	WHEREAS, meaningful funding from the account will be available starting in
32	2019, and
33	WHEREAS, the Youth Action Plan defines youth as people from ages sixteen to
34	twenty-five, and
35	WHEREAS, economic status and race are predictors educational outcomes and
36	economic mobility, and
37	WHEREAS, King County has traditionally not been involved in providing direct
38	educational services to children or youth, and
39	WHEREAS, King County is fortunate to be home to dozens of organizations that
40	work to improve educational outcomes for students and youth in all parts of the county;
41	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

42	A. King County will utilize moneys from the Puget Sound taxpayers'
43	accountability account to meet the following goals:
44	1. Ensure every child in King County is ready for kindergarten;
45	2. Improve educational outcomes for children and youth who are homeless, in
46	the foster care system, in the child welfare system, involved in the juvenile justice system
47	or otherwise vulnerable;
48	3. Close the opportunity gap for children and youth of color and low-income
49	children and youth;
50	4. End the school to prison pipeline and reduce youth involvement in the
51	criminal justice system;
52	5. Embody the King County equity and social justice goal;
53	6. Ensure all youth in King County are prepared to fill the jobs of the future; and
54	7. Build a legacy for King County that lasts beyond the duration of the funding.
55	B. In order to meet the goals stated in section A. of this motion, King County will
56	use the following principles:
57	1. Maximize the impact of the funding by focusing on no more than three areas
58	for investment;
59	2. Invest in programs and projects consistent with the limited duration of the
60	funding as much as possible, such as facility or pilot projects;
61	3. Prioritize programs that are evidence based or promising practices and have
62	measurable outcomes, while also investing in innovative approaches;
63	4. Include funding for direct services provided in and by the community being
64	served; and

65	5. Leverage existing initiatives, organizations, programs and funding sources,
66	such as the Youth Action Plan, , the Children and Youth Advisory Board, the Best Starts
67	for Kids Levy, and the Veterans, Seniors and Human Services Levy, as well as related
68	investments by cities, the state of Washington, schools employers and private
69	foundations.
70	C. Puget Sound taxpayers' accountability account funding will be directed to the
71	following priority areas:
72	1. Early learning;
73	2. K-12 education for vulnerable and underserved children and youth; and
74	3. College, career, and technical education.
75	D. The council initiative's director will lead the development of the
76	implementation plan and will coordinate with the appropriate legislative branch and
77	executive branch staff. The council initiatives director should provide an oral update on
78	the progress of developing the implementation plan to the council's committee of the
79	whole each quarter.
80	E. The King County council will engage a consultant to help facilitate
81	community outreach and prepare an implementation plan, for the life of the account,
82	guided by the goals and principles stated in section A and B of this motion, targeting the
83	priority areas in section C of this motion, and in accordance with section F of this motion
84	The consultant shall meet with stakeholders and subject-matter experts when drafting the
