## **Motion 11415**

2002-0160.2 Sullivan and Phillips **Sponsors** Proposed No. 1 A MOTION recommending the inclusion of a project labor 2 agreement for the Harborview Medical Center bond program and providing direction to the county's 3 representative on the oversight committee. 4 5 6 WHEREAS, the King County council approved Ordinance 14295 on March 4, 7 8 2002, authorizing and directing the county executive to enter into an agreement for the 9 provision of project management services between the University of Washington, 10 Harborview Medical Center (HMC) and King County, and 11 WHEREAS, the King County Council directed the county executive in Ordinance 14295, Section 7, to evaluate whether one or more project labor agreements (PLAs) 12 would reasonably achieve the HMC construction project's labor, employment and 13 economic objectives and facilitate the completion of construction contracts on time and 14 15 within budget, and WHEREAS, the objectives of the HMC project are to finance, design and 16 construct certain public health and safety improvements for the HMC campus, including 17

18	but not limited to seismic upgrades, renovations and construction of new buildings for
19	patient care, research, teaching and administration as well as certain facilities to meet
20	requirements of the county medical examiner, and
21	WHEREAS, the county's apprenticeship utilization goals to enhance participation
22	of minorities, women, persons with disabilities and economically disadvantaged youth
23	are important regional labor and employment objectives and are incorporated in the
24	Agreement for Project Management Services with the University of Washington and
25 .	Harborview Medical Center, and
26	WHEREAS, completing the construction contracts on time and within budget is
27	important for the public health and safety, and
28	WHEREAS, the executive's representatives have undertaken a study of PLAs in
29	the Puget Sound region, obtained copies of recent PLAs utilized by local agencies
30	including Sound Transit, the port of Seattle, the city of Seattle and other major projects
31	including the baseball and football stadiums, and interviewed project managers and their
32	representatives, and
33	WHEREAS, the executive representatives have reviewed materials provided by
34	both proponents and opponents of PLAs from both past and current projects and
35	considered the arguments made in favor and opposition to PLAs, and
36	WHEREAS, project labor agreement can be tailored to meet King County

objectives, and may be signed by unions and contractors, without requiring the owner to

39	WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court upheld their legality in 1993 and
40	PLAs have sustained legal challenges on both constitutional and public procurement
41	competition bases, and
42	WHEREAS, PLAs may establish the terms of employment and work conditions
43	for the duration of the project, and
44	WHEREAS, PLAs have been increasingly utilized on public works projects
45	across the nation, and
46	WHEREAS, many states have established standards and processes for the use and
47	inclusion of PLAs, and
48	WHEREAS, in 1996 the governor of this state signed Executive Order 96-08,
49	declaring PLAs are of "great potential economic benefit for appropriate and time
50	sensitive major construction projects which will extend for a substantial period of time,
51	involve a substantial number of contractors, subcontractors and trades and craft workers,
52	and have a substantial dollar value," and
53	WHEREAS, formal studies have been prepared in this region on behalf of other
54	public agencies identifying the use of regional crafts and potential cost savings for public
55	projects. These studies have been obtained and reviewed by the executive and are
56	incorporated in the executive's report to the council so no comparable study is required,
57	and
58	WHEREAS, the primary benefit attributed to PLAs is that they offer ongoing
59	labor harmony between trades and union and non-union laborers, and

60	WHEREAS, the public interest will be promoted by negotiating agreements to
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61	reduce labor disruptions, such as strikes, lockouts or slowdowns, which could adversely
62	affect completion of the project, and
63	WHEREAS, other local public projects demonstrate that labor unions, contractors
64	and owners have successfully negotiated PLAs that streamline the working relationship
65	between the trades and crafts used on the project, and
66	WHEREAS, the anecdotal evidence received from project managers on
67 .	comparably complex projects in this region shows that those projects with PLAs are on
68	schedule and on budget and the relationships between the project managers and the
69	unions are collegial, and
70	WHEREAS, both private and public project managers claim they have better
71	control of costs, efficiency, quality, safety and schedule with the negotiated PLAs, and
72	WHEREAS, all local PLAs include provisions that guarantee labor peace and no-
73	strike requirements for the life of the contract, offer speedy jurisdictional dispute
74	resolution, recognize seniority and encourage creative apprenticeship opportunities, and
75	WHEREAS, concerns have been raised about restricting open shop contractors
76	from competing on the project and negative impact on small disadvantaged businesses
77	and minority and women-owned businesses, and
78	WHEREAS, terms of PLAs may be negotiated with union leadership to increase
79	apprenticeship opportunities, waive union labor requirements for certain minority and
80	women's business enterprises and small disadvantaged businesses from within this
81	region, and waive the "double benefit" requirements assessed to a nonunion company;
82	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

83	A. King County has determined that if certain principles described further in
84	subsection B of this motion are incorporated into a project labor agreement, then:
85	1. PLAs may streamline the construction schedule by reducing labor-related
86	disruption during the term of the HMC project;
87	2. PLAs may reduce labor-related disputes impacting the operation of the
88	Harborview Medical Center during the construction schedule;
89	3. PLAs may ensure access to skilled labor;
90 .	4. PLAs may promote diversity of HMC project workforce and increase
91	apprenticeship opportunities;
92	5. Opposition to PLAs may be mitigated by allowing a negotiated number of
93	core employees for nonunion shops, allowing nonunion shops that provide their own
94	benefits to waive the duplicative union benefit requirements, and waiving union-labor
95	requirements on a case-by-case basis for regional minority and women's business
96	enterprises and small disadvantaged businesses; and
97	6. Additional costs associated with negotiating and administering PLAs are
98	offset by the labor harmony achieved in regional projects.
99	B. Any implemented PLA or PLAs shall include provisions incorporating the
100	following principles:
101	1. Guarantee no strikes, walkouts or job actions that interrupt project work;
102	2. Agree on binding dispute resolution provisions to resolve all labor disputes
103	between the general contractor/general manager, subcontractors and crafts with
104	provisions for liquidated damages for costs associated with labor disturbances or delays;


105	3. Agree to provide adequate and continuous regional workforce and, if
106	necessary, to obtain labor from outside the region to ensure timely completion;
107	4. Agree on clear application of PLA provisions to all construction craft
108	employees on-site but not to general contractor/general manager, King County,
109	Harborview, University of Washington employees or off-site manufacturers;
110	5. Agree on nondiscriminatory hiring practices for nonunion labor that authorize
111	continued employment of companies' core employees;
112 、	6. Allow open-shop contractors who offer benefits to their employees to
113	continue to offer their benefit plan without paying for union benefits;
114	7. Use and deployment of apprenticeship programs meeting and exceeding the
115	county's goals;
116	8. Increase opportunities for participation by regional companies owned by
117	minorities, women and economically disadvantaged businesses, including but not limited
118	to waiving union labor requirements, and utilizing flexible bonding options; and
119	9. Standardize hours, shifts, work start, and related issues.
120	C. The county representative to the oversight committee shall request that the
121	oversight committee review and consider for approval the implementation of one or more
122	PLAs.
123	D. The county representative shall request that the oversight committee assign
124	responsibility for negotiating any PLA to either the general contractor/construction
125	manager or to an experienced contractor selected by the oversight committee.

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E. The specific scope, form, nature and content of the PLA or PLAs shall be 126 determined by the oversight committee. 127
