



Complex Drivers of Current SUD Crisis

- Drug supply, lethality, and costs
- Historical approaches to the problem
- Lack of access to treatment
- Need for new and varied treatment models

Drug Supply, Lethality, and Costs

- Changes to the drug supply.
- Easier for experimentation.





Historical Approaches to the Problem

- The War on Drugs has had a disproportionate impact on communities of color.
- In King County, we see large disparities in health outcomes like overdoses in the American Indian/Alaskan Native (NH) and Black (NH) communities.
- Reflect on the impact of incarceration on these communities, generational trauma, and ACEs.
