1	AN ORDINANCE relating to the renaming of the	
2	International District Station, located in the Downtown	
3	Seattle Transit Tunnel, to International District/Chinatown	
4	Station; making technical changes; amending Ordinance	
5	11950, Section 13, and K.C.C. 28.92.220 and Ordinance	
6	11950, Section 15 (part), and K.C.C. 28.96.040 and adding	
7	a new section to K.C.C. chapter 28.94.

10	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:	
11	SECTION 1. Findings. The King County council makes the following findings	
12	with regard to the International District Station:	
13	A. The International District Station is one of five stations located in the	
14	Downtown Seattle Transit Tunnel.	
15	B. Located at South Jackson Street and 5th Avenue South, the International	
16	District Station is the southern terminus for the Downtown Seattle Transit Tunnel.

17	C. Currently utilized as passenger facilities for the Metro Bus System and Sound
18	Transit's Regional Express Bus program, the stations in the Downtown Seattle Transit
19	Tunnel will also be used for Sound Transit's Central LINK Light Rail when it begins
20	service.
21	D. The International District Station reflects the history and culture of the nearby
22	International District with brightly painted steel shelters and symbols of the Chinese
23	calendar built into the station plaza floor with cut and colored brick.
24	E. Many people in the community have expressed interest in renaming the
25	International District Station to include a reference to Chinatown. One of the city's
26	oldest neighborhoods, the area currently known as the International District has
27	historically been also been referred to as Chinatown. By 1876, more than one in six
28	residents of Seattle was of Chinese ancestry. The name International District/Chinatown
29	more fully reflects the contributions and history of the community including both Chinese
30	and persons of other ethnic heritages who have settled and worked there for over one
31	hundred forty years.
32	F. In recent years there has been a push by Chinese community leaders to
33	acknowledge the diverse roots of the International District. The City of Seattle
34	recognized this when it opened the new International District/Chinatown Community
35	Center in August 2004. The Seattle International District/Chinatown Public Library
36	branch is slated to open in 2005.
37	G. It is appropriate to name the transit station to reflect the combined Chinese
38	and other international sources of history and culture of the International

40	SECTION 2. Ordinance 11950, Section 13, and K.C.C.28.92.220 are each hereb		
41	amended to read as follows:		
42	Tunnel plaza area(( $(+)$ )s(( $+)$ )) or plaza areas. Tunnel plaza area(( $(+)$ )s(( $+)$ )) or plaze		
43	area((())s(())) are those portions of the International District/Chinatown and Convention		
44	Place tunnel stations ((which)) that are located at the surface street level and ((which))		
45	that provide $access(f)$ or egress to the subsurface levels.		
46	NEW SECTION. SECTION 3. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 28.94 a		
47	new section to read as follows:		
48	Downtown Seattle Transit Tunnel stations. The stations in the Downtown		
49	Seattle Transit Tunnel shall be known as Convention Place Station, Westlake Station,		
50	University Street Station, Pioneer Square Station and International District/Chinatown		
51	Station.		
52	SECTION 4. Ordinance 11950, Section 15 (part), and K.C.C.28.96.040 are each		
53	hereby amended to read as follows:		
54	Tunnel mezzanine and plaza areas.		
55	A. Public communication activities ((which)) that are otherwise lawful are		
56	permitted in mezzanine and plaza areas subject to the prohibitions, limits, exceptions,		
57	terms and conditions of this chapter.		
58	B. Signs, leaflets, posters, flyers, pamphlets, brochures and written, pictorial or		
59	graphic material of any kind, structures, banners and any other paraphernalia may not be		
60	posted or affixed to tunnel property or erected in or on tunnel property.		
61	C. Signs carried by or on a person are permitted, provided the signs are not		
62	constructed of a size or material ((which)) that could inadvertently or intentionally cause		

injury to a person or property. Signs must not be of a size that obstructs the free flow of pedestrians and must not exceed ((36)) thirty-six inches by ((36)) thirty-six inches in any case. A (("))sandwich board((")) sign must not extend significantly beyond the carrier's shoulders.

D. Public communication activities are not permitted within fifteen (((15))) feet of any stairway, escalator, elevator, entrance, customer service counter, ticket or automatic teller machine or authorized commercial activity. Public communications activities are not permitted within five (((5))) feet of any fire safety system component, telephone, information board or news vending machine. Additionally, public communications activities must not block normal pedestrian paths to and from the areas noted ((above)) in this subsection.

E. For safety and security reasons, to ensure that the free flow of pedestrians((5)) and the intended transportation functions of the tunnel stations are met and to accommodate other activities competing for the limited available space, a collective maximum number of individuals allowed to engage in public communications activities at any one <u>Downtown Seattle Transit</u> ((†))<u>T</u>unnel location is hereby established. Because of different station configurations, the number of individuals allowed to engage in public communication activities at the same location and time shall be limited as follows:

94	F. A single group whose number of participants is known in advance, or is found a		
95	the time, to consist of four $(((4)))$ or more persons shall be required to obtain a letter of		
96	authorization in accordance with ((subsection E of Section)) K.C.C. 28.96.060.E.		
97	G. Individuals or groups engaged in public communication activities who desire to		
98	use a table or public address system, loudspeaker or other sound amplifying device must		
99	obtain a letter of authorization with the appropriate endorsement(((s))) or endorsements in		
100	accordance with ((Sections)) K.C.C. 28.96.060, 28.96.070((5)) and 28.96.080.		
101	H. Persons engaged in public communications activities in compliance with		
102	((Section)) K.C.C. 28.96.020 may nevertheless be required to cease or to move to another		
103	specified area within the same or a different tunnel location if the number of persons		
104	engaged in public communication activities, their location or their manner of conducting		
105	the activities creates safety or security problems, interferes with the free flow of persons		

into, within((5)) or from a plaza or mezzanine area or interferes with the operation use and quiet enjoyment of the facility or transit service therein.
