Coordinated entry has simplified access for families

Last year, families:

- Made multiple calls to multiple agencies, median of 45 calls
- Were required to check in multiple times a week or every day
- Repeated their story multiple times

Today:

- Families call one number for assistance
- Providers receive eligible referrals matched to their resources and interventions
- System resources allocated based on need with fairness

King County now has a comprehensive view of families seeking assistance


- Since April 23, just over 2,000 families have requested homeless housing and services.
- The dataset is very complete and includes:
 - Family characteristics
 - Service requests
 - Housing barriers


Young parents, young children

Around a third are young parents (age 25 or under).

Around half of those are between 18 and 21 years old.

About half of the children are not yet school age (under age 6). Around half of those are very young children (age 2 or under).





Persons of color are over-represented relative to the general population and those in poverty.













Inform systems transformation work: right-size resources and interventions for families

Data from the first five months of coordinated entry for families...

- MATCH national and local Westat data. Homeless families have characteristics <u>similar to other extremely poor families</u>, and are experiencing a <u>temporary economic and housing</u> <u>crisis</u>.
- SHOW that families' barriers to housing are <u>low</u> overall, suggesting that <u>shorter-term interventions</u> focused on <u>quickly</u> <u>placing families in their own housing</u> with supports would succeed in our community.
- CONFIRM that the systems transformation and retooling work of the Family Homelessness Initiative is on the right track, including a focus on rapid rehousing and right-sizing our homeless housing interventions.
