

Potential Actions

- Explicit mutual assessments between related sectors (also rec 17)
- > Acknowledge shared interests in housing stability
- Smaller scale investments to stabilize people in housing and maintain existing housing stock
- > Track housing stability over time (also recs 3, 18)



Slide Appendix: Intersecting Recommendations

Recommendation 17: Alignment of Policymaking Assess laws and policies in all areas of government for their potential to affect interrelated goals in other areas.

Potential Actions

- Assess for both mutual benefit and unintended consequences
- Support time and resources for coordination
- Align closely with poverty reduction strategies

Questions to Consider

What other sectors will be affected by the actions you want to take?

What sectors do you need to rely on to succeed?

What barriers are you inadvertently contributing to?

What new relationships would be helpful?

In what areas might you develop and advance policies jointly with others?

How would this strengthen your alignment with each of the guiding principles?

Recommendation 9: Coordinated Pathway System Cultivate operational connections among entities working on outreach, entry into the homelessness response system, placement in housing, and longer-term housing stability.

Potential Actions

- Avoid duplicative eligibility determination and enrollment
- Facilitate and track completion of referrals (also rec 11)
- Support flexibility to address specific circumstances
- Track pathways longitudinally (also recs 3, 18)
- Provide infrastructure for coordination
- ➤ Align policymaking (rec 17)

Questions to Consider

Relationships: What connections do you already have that facilitate coordinated pathways? What new relationships would be useful?

Internal Operations: What internal changes could better connect you with other systems?

Collective Action: Who do you have shared interests with that you might not realize? Whose interests might you be inadvertently competing with?

Learning: What do you need to learn to check assumptions you make about other systems?

How would this strengthen your alignment with each of the guiding principles?

Recommendation 12: Circumstances of Precarious Housing Expand investments that stabilize individuals or households with circumstances of precarious housing.

Potential Actions

- Bridging grants or loans for unanticipated expenses
- Access to supports matched to specific circumstances that destabilize housing
- > Track housing stability over time
- Comprehensive strategies to mitigate eviction and default
- Invest in maintaining current housing stock

Questions to Consider

Internal: What supports can you make available to employees who experience or are at risk of precarious housing?

Programs and Services: What would it take to track housing stability over time and across systems? How could you recognize and respond to early warning signs of housing instability?

Funders: How could you invest in stabilizing precarious housing? How can funding be flexible to respond to specific circumstances that put housing stability at risk?

Policy and Strategy: How can strategies for affordable housing incorporate stabilizing current housing?

How would this strengthen your alignment with each of the guiding principles?
