1	AN ORDINANCE concerning the governance model for
2	the King County fairgrounds and board member
3	compensation; and amending Ordinance 12075, Section 5,
4	as amended, and K.C.C. 2.32.040, Ordinance 1128 (part),
5	as amended, and K.C.C. 2.32.050 and Ordinance 11955,
6	Section 9, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.16.045.

8	
9	STATEMENT OF FACTS:
10	1. The county's current expense fund faces significant challenges as
11	revenue growth has slowed dramatically at the same time as the cost to
12	deliver mandated county services continue to escalate.
13	2. The county, as a result of current and on-going fiscal crisis, has taken
14	action to ensure both short-term and long-term viability of its parks and
15	recreation services.
16	3. The metropolitan parks task force was established in the spring of 2002
17	to find ways to keep the county parks and recreation system open in 2003

18	and thereafter and to restore stability to the park system by removing it
19	from dependence on the current expense fund.
20	4. The metropolitan parks task force issued its recommendations in June
21	2002.
22	5. One of the recommendations of the task force was that the park and
23	recreation division carries out its refocused mission by aggressively
24	implementing a broad variety of new entrepreneurial strategies throughout
25	the park system, including the fairgrounds, that will help raise revenues to
26	support park operations.
27	6. The King County fairgrounds is an 81.5-acre site with the ability to
28	generate year-round revenues at the fairground beyond the operations of
29	the King County fair event.
30	7. The King County fair board has historically provided direction
31	regarding the operation of the King County fair.
32	8. To more-effectively implement the recommendations of the
33	metropolitan parks task force, the King County fairgrounds needs a citizen
34	board that provides input into the fairgrounds operations year-round and to
35	provide direction and actions to enhance the revenue capabilities of the
36	fairgrounds and fair operations.
37	9. In November 2002, the King County council asked for a
38	comprehensive review of potential alternative organizational and
39	governance models for the King County.
40	10. Ordinance 14509, Section 45, reads as follows:

41	"The director of natural resources and parks shall file with
42	the clerk of the council by April 30, 2003, fifteen copies of
43	a comprehensive review of potential alternative
44	organizational and governance models for the King County
45	fairgrounds, including, but not limited to, structural
46	alternatives such as formation of a 501(c)(3) organization, a
47	public development authority and contracting out
48	management and operation of the facility to a third party,
49	through a competitive bid process. In developing a
50	recommendation for a model, the director shall consider the
51	following:
52	A. The ability of the alternative to support effective
53	accounting and fiscal tracking procedures for revenues and
54	expenditures associated with fairground operations;
55	B. The ability of the alternative to effectively market the
56	features and facilities of the fairgrounds;
57	C. The ability of the alternative to extend the revenue-
58	producing activities of the fairgrounds over the entire year;
59	and
50	D. The ability of the alternative to support services that
51	achieve full cost recovery."

62	11. In March 2003, the parks and recreation division requested that the
63	fairgrounds report be transmitted in June 2003 pending the outcome of the
64	May 20 levy election.
65	12. The maintenance and operation levy for regional and rural parks
66	passed on May 20, 2003.
67	13. The parks and recreation division completed a comprehensive
68	analysis of the various governance models identified in Ordinance 14509,
69	Section 45.
70	14. In June 2003, the county executive transmitted the King County
71	Fairgrounds Study to the King County council.
72	15. This proposed reconfiguration and establishment of a fairgrounds
73	board will assist in instilling the entrepreneurial spirit in the fairgrounds
74	and the fair with the hope of additional revenue generation along with a
75	continued focus on the core values of the fairgrounds.
76	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
77	SECTION 1. Ordinance 12075, Section 5, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.32.040 are
78	each hereby amended to read as follows:
79	((Fair)) Fairgrounds board.
80	A. It is the intent of the council to ((reduce the administrative workload of the King
81	County fair board and to)) clarify the relationships between, and responsibilities of, the
82	county and the ((fair)) fairgrounds board. The ((fair)) fairgrounds board is hereby
83	designated the following responsibilities:

84	1. To provide recommendations, advise and assist in the planning and conduct of
85	the King County fair and fairgrounds;
86	2. To function as a vital point of interface between King County, the citizenry of
87	the county and key groups upon whose participation a successful ((fair)) fairgrounds
88	operation depends;
89	3. To actively participate in the activities of the fair and fairgrounds, particularly
90	with respect to ((the)) revenue generation and agricultural and youth-oriented events ((and
91	activities at the fair));
92	4. To serve in a liaison capacity with participating groups and officials ((in)) at
93	the fair and fairgrounds;
94	5. To make recommendations on the proposed fair and fairgrounds budget; and
95	6. To communicate directly with the ((county executive, the county council, and
96	the director of the department of natural resources and parks at its discretion. Such action
97	is particularly encouraged in those instances where the fair board considers that its policies
98	or recommendations are not being followed)) fairgrounds manager and the manager of the
99	parks and recreation division.
100	B. ((The fair board shall consist of the following members, all of whom shall vote
101	except as noted:
102	1. Thirteen members each representing a specific council district shall be
103	selected by the county executive from a list of one or more nominees presented to him or
104	her by the councilmember representing that district, provided as follows:
105	a. if no nominees are submitted for the district within thirty days from the
106	effective date of the vacancy, the executive may make his or her own selection; and

107	b. the terms of office for the member from each council district shall be for a
108	three-year period commencing October 1.
109	2. The director of the King County extension service or his or her designee;
110	3. One member selected by the King-County vocational agriculture instructors'
111	organization, the Future Farmers of America;
112	4. Two members selected by the members of the King County 4-H leader's
113	council;
114	5. Two nonvoting youth members; one appointed by the agriculture teachers
115	from the membership of the Future Farmers of America and one appointed by the King
116	County extension agent from the membership of 4-H; and
117	6. One representative from the city of Enumelaw to be appointed by the mayor
118	of the city of Enumclaw and confirmed by the Enumclaw city council))
119	1. It is the further intent of the council that the fairgrounds board and the parks
120	and recreation division give particular attention to the following elements of fairground
121	operations:
122	a. the development and enhancement of revenue-generating events and
123	activities at the fairgrounds over the entire year;
124	b. the generation of revenue from the activities and events of the fair and the
125	fairgrounds, such that the goal is to have a fair and fairgrounds that are self-supporting by
126	2006;
127	c. the utilization of transparent, accurate and effective accounting and fiscal
128	tracking mechanisms, that are consistent with generally accepted accounting principals,
129	in the operation of the fair and fairgrounds; and

130	d. the energetic and effective marketing of the fair and fairgrounds, as a means
131	of maximizing the awareness and participation of the regional community in the events
132	and activities of the fair and fairgrounds.
133	2. The parks and recreation division shall report to the council by September 15
134	of each year on progress on each of the elements in subsection B.1. of this section. This
135	report shall include a copy of all recommendations and reports forwarded by the
136	fairgrounds board to the fairgrounds manager and the manager of the parks and recreation
137	division, including any policies or recommendations that have not been incorporated into
138	fairground operations.
139	C.1. Nominations to the fairgrounds board may be proposed individually by
140	members of the county council or by the county executive, or both, with final selection
141	by the county executive and confirmation by the county council, except for the city of
142	Enumclaw representative, who shall be nominated and confirmed by the city of
143	Enumclaw. For the first term of service established in accordance with this section after
144	the effective date of this section, one-third of the terms shall end September 30, 2005,
145	one-third of the terms shall end September 30, 2006, and one-third of the terms shall end
146	September 30, 2007, designated at the discretion of the executive; thereafter, the terms of
147	service shall each be three years. Terms shall commence October 1 except that, for the
148	first term of service established in accordance with this section after the effective date of
149	this section, the respective term shall begin upon confirmation of each member by the
150	council.
151	2. The fairgrounds board shall consist of eleven members representing the
152	following:

153	a. fundraising;
154	b. marketing and advertising;
155	c. accounting principles and standards;
156	d. event production and promotion;
157	e. fair events and activities;
158	f. livestock and agriculture;
159	g. youth and youth oriented activities;
160	h. the downtown Enumclaw business community;
161	i. the city of Enumclaw; and
162	j. the general public, represented by two at-large members.
163	((C.)) D. The ((fair)) King County fairgrounds is designated the ((line of))
164	responsibility of the department of natural resources and parks.
165	$((D_{-}))$ \underline{E} The $((fair))$ fairgrounds board shall recommend at least three candidates
166	for the position of ((fair)) fairground manager to the ((director)) manager of the
167	((department of natural resources and)) parks and recreation division. The ((director))
168	manager of the parks and recreation division shall appoint the ((fair)) fairground manager
169	after considering the ((fair)) fairgrounds board's recommendation. The ((fair)) fairground
170	manager ((will)) shall report to the ((director or his or her)) manager of the parks and
171	recreation division or the manager of the parks and recreation division's designee. ((The
172	position will be exempt from career service.)) The ((fair)) fairgrounds manager shall
173	attend all regular meetings of the ((fair)) fairgrounds board and keep the ((fair)) board
174	informed of all developments concerning the ((fair)) fairgrounds.

175	((E. The fair manager shall consult with the fair board in connection with the
176	submittal of a budget for the operation of the fair and fairgrounds. The proposed budget
177	will be submitted to the fair board whose comments and recommended modifications, if
178	any, will be included in or appended to the budget documentation forwarded to the
179	executive and the county council. No budget shall be presented for adoption which
180	cannot be shown to have reasonable expectation of operating the fair, its maintenance and
181	proposed improvements from funds accruing from fair revenues.))
182	F. All moneys received by or on behalf of the ((fair)) fairgrounds shall be
183	deposited in the appropriate county ((treasury)) fund. All expenditures incurred in
184	operation of the ((fair)) fairgrounds and ((fair)) board shall be in accordance with
185	procedures, ordinances and general laws governing the financial administration of King
186	County.
187	((G. Capital improvements to the fairgrounds at Enumelaw, Washington, shall be
188	paid for from revenues generated by the fair, its revenues and grants, gifts and other
189	moneys accruing to the fair from other than the county current expense fund, unless
190	otherwise provided by ordinance. The use of bonds for purposes of capital improvements
191	may be proposed, subject to approval of the executive and thereafter upon review and
192	approval of the council. No substantial change in land use at the fairgrounds or adjacent
193	property will be made without the express approval of the council.))
194	H.)) G. The ((fair)) fairgrounds board shall establish rules governing its
195	operation including provision for removal of members for cause.
196	SECTION 2. Ordinance 11287 (part), as amended, and K.C.C. 2.32.050 are each
197	hereby amended to read as follows:

((Fair)) Fairgrounds board – ((C))compensation. ((For time devoted to the official work of the fair board, each)) The members ((thereof shall receive a per diem of fifty dollars to be paid out of the current expense fund; provided, that a per diem of twenty-five dollars shall be paid for official board work of three hours or less)) of the fairgrounds board shall serve without compensation, but the members shall be reimbursed for all travel expenses incidental to such services as to the amount authorized by law.

SECTION 3. Ordinance 11955, Section 9, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.16.045 are each hereby amended to read as follows:

Department of natural resources and parks - duties - divisions.

A. The department of natural resources and parks is responsible to manage and be fiscally accountable for the wastewater treatment division, water and land resources division, solid waste division and parks and recreation division. The department shall manage, design, develop, operate maintain and enhance the geographic information systems for the county and other contracting agencies. The department shall administer and implement the requirements of the federal Clean Water Act, federal Endangered Species Act and other federal and state laws and regulations related to those requirements. The department shall perform the metropolitan water pollution abatement function referred to in this section as "the water quality program," as set forth in chapter 35.58 RCW, K.C.C. Title 28 and other federal and state laws and regulations applicable to that function, although financial planning for and administration of the water quality program shall be conducted consistent with financial policies approved by the council. The department shall coordinate the county's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("NPDES") municipal stormwater permit program. The department shall provide

the support to the county's participation in the regional water supply planning process including the development of reclaimed water and the review of local utility district plans for conformance with county plans and policies and shall participate in the process of preparing coordinated water system plans to ensure conformance with county plans and policies. The department shall provide for the active and passive recreational needs of the region, consistent with the mission of the parks and recreation division described in subsection E.1 of this section. The department shall designate as natural resource lands those county-owned lands that serve important natural resource functions, including, but not limited to, benefiting and protecting natural drainage systems, drainage basins, flood control systems, ecosystems, water quality, ground water, fisheries and wildlife habitat and other natural resource purposes. The department shall act to ensure integration of environmental programs across utility and resource functions and to balance stewardship with economic development issues. To ensure integration and balanced stewardship through the director's office the department shall oversee strategic planning using staff resources budgeted in the department's divisions. Strategic planning may include, but not be limited to: integration of land and water resource protection; coordination of groundwater, water reuse and water supply plan approval; development of new funding approaches for resource protection; establishment of new partnerships with businesses, community organizations and citizens; and better coordination of sewerage and flood control facilities to prevent water quality degradation.

B.1. The duties of the waste water treatment division shall include the following:

242	a. administering the functions and programs related to the operation,
243	maintenance, construction, repair, replacement and improvement of the metropolitan
244	sewerage system and its financing;
245	b. administering the county's sewage disposal agreements with cities and
246	special districts;
247	c. providing planning for the water quality capital program;
248	d. providing design, engineering and construction management services related
249	to the water quality capital programs including new facilities development and
250	maintenance of the existing infrastructure;
251	e. providing support services such as project management, environmental
252	review, permit and right-of-way acquisitions, scheduling and project control; and
253	f. regulating industrial discharges into the metropolitan sewerage system.
254	2. The council may assign responsibility for services ancillary to and in support
255	of the operation and maintenance of the metropolitan water pollution abatement system
256	under chapter 35.58 RCW, including, but not limited to, human resources, accounting,
257	budgeting, finance, engineering, fleet administration, maintenance, laboratory,
258	monitoring, inspection and planning, as it determines appropriate.
259	C. The duties of the water and land resources division shall include the
260	following:
261	1. Proposing or updating, or both, and implementing adopted policies, plans and
262	programs relating to water and land resources, open space and other natural resources that
263	protect fisheries, natural resources, water quality and ground water and that solve and
264	prevent drainage problems;

265	2. Responding to major river floods and addressing drainage problems in
266	unincorporated portions of the county as provided in K.C.C. Title 9, the Surface Water
267	Management Program, in K.C.C. chapter 20.12, the King County Flood Hazard
268	Reduction Plan Policies and other policies established by the council;
269	3. Within available resources, maintaining major river channels, and surface and
270	storm drainage systems and lands to minimize flood hazards and protect fisheries
271	resources, drainage systems and lands, and water quality;
272	4. Providing coordination and technical assistance within the county and other
273	governments to assist in setting and implementing priorities for water and land resources,
274	including sample collection, laboratory services, monitoring, analysis and other activities
275	to protect, enhance and evaluate the quality of land, habitat and water resources in the
276	county;
277	5. Planning the surface water management capital program, providing design,
278	engineering and construction management services related to the surface water
279	management capital program including new facilities development and maintenance of
280	the existing infrastructure and providing support services such as project management,
281	environmental review, permit and right-of-way acquisitions, scheduling and project
282	control;
283	6. Preparing standards for storm water management facilities that are
284	constructed as part of land development;
285	7. Providing technical assistance and education to businesses and the general

public to encourage environmental stewardship;

287	8. Implementing the county park, open space, trails, agriculture, forestry, and
288	other natural resources acquisition programs, including planning, site selection,
289	financing, acquisition, project budget management and purchasing fee and less than fee
290	interests;
291	9. Monitoring and protecting the county's real property and development rights
292	interests acquired through the conservation futures and other open space and natural
293	resource programs ensuring to the greatest extent practicable that subsequent county land
294	use policies remain compatible with the acquired interests;
295	10. Preparing and implementing the management plans for protection and use of
296	the natural resource values of county owned lands, including natural resource lands,
297	dedicated and deeded open space lands and lands acquired by the county as a condition of
298	land development approval, and determining appropriate means to execute such
299	management plans;
300	11. Administering, operating and maintaining those lands designated as natural
301	resource lands, using any work forces as appropriate;
302	12. The office of rural and resource lands shall be a distinct functional unit of
303	the division reporting directly to the water and land resources division manager. The
304	office shall plan, manage and be responsible for administering the county's rural and
305	resource lands programs including, but not limited to, agriculture, farmlands preservation,
306	current use taxation programs, forestry, noxious weeds, terrestrial wildlife and habitat,
307	rural economic development, and encouraging environmental stewardship.
308	D. The duties of the solid waste division shall include the following:

309	1. Managing and operating the county's comprehensive solid waste program on
310	a self-supporting basis;
311	2. Administering the county's solid waste interlocal agreements with cities and
312	towns;
313	3. Diverting as much material as possible from disposal in a manner that
314	reduces the overall costs of solid waste management to county residents and businesses,
315	conserves resources, protects the environment and strengthens the county's economy;
316	4. Managing and being accountable for all transfer station operations and
317	landfills, as well as the transportation of waste between county facilities;
318	5. Procuring and maintaining all capital and operating equipment specific to the
319	solid waste function;
320	6. Providing planning, design, engineering and construction management
321	services related to the solid waste capital program including new facilities development
322	and maintenance of existing infrastructure;
323	7. Providing support services such as project management, environmental
324	review, permit acquisitions, scheduling and project control; and
325	8. Actively pursuing all revenue sources in an effort to maintain the lowest
326	possible rate structure for the benefit of county residents.
327	E. The duties of the parks and recreation division shall include the following:
328	1. Carrying out the county's parks and recreation division mission, which is to
329	provide regional trails, regional passive parks, regional resource and ecological lands and
330	regional active recreation facilities, rural parks and local unincorporated area parks within
331	the urban growth boundary until annexed, by employing entrepreneurial strategies that

332	raise revenues to support park operations and facilitating agreements with other
333	jurisdictions and entities to provide for recreational services and other activities;
334	2. Proposing and implementing adopted polities, plans and programs related to
335	the provision of regional and rural parks and recreation facilities and programs in King
336	County and local parks in the unincorporated portion of King County within the urban
337	growth boundary until those areas are annexed;
338	3. Within available resources, managing, operating and maintaining or
339	facilitating the management, operation and maintenance of the county parks and
340	recreation facilities;
341	4. Within available resources, maintaining or facilitating the maintenance of
342	regional resource and ecological lands at the direction of the water and land resources
343	division,;
344	5. Developing and maintaining an operational master plan and develop and
345	monitoring a capital improvement plan as defined in K.C.C. chapter 4.04;
346	6. Within available resources, developing and facilitating agreements for the
347	development of specific active park and recreation facilities;
348	7. Coordinating with other departments and divisions as appropriate in the
349	preparation of grant applications for park and open space acquisition, development and
350	operations;
351	8. Developing, managing, or facilitating agreements for the provision of
352	recreational programs;
353	9. Facilitating programs that promote the safe enjoyment of county-owned
354	swimming pools and guarded swim beaches; and

355 10.
