#### Ordinance 19397

Sponsors Zahilay and Kohl-Welles **Proposed No.** 2021-0364.2 1 AN ORDINANCE relating to the King County children 2 and youth advisory board; and amending Ordinance 18217, 3 Section 2, as amended, and K.C.C. 2A.300.510. 4 STATEMENT OF FACTS: 5 1. In April 2015, the metropolitan King County council approved Motion 6 14378, adopting the Youth Action Plan. The Youth Action Plan 7 recommended that King County create an advisory board to support the 8 county's system wide accountability for serving children and families and 9 youth and young adults. The task force recommended this be "an 10 inclusive body comprised of a wide array of citizens, stakeholders, and 11 entities that can draw upon experience, knowledge and information to 12 assist King County policymakers as they consider outcomes, policies, and 13 investments for children and families and youth and young adults." 14 2. In July 2015, Ordinance 18088 submitted to the voters of King County 15 a proposition known as "best starts for kids levy," authorizing a regular 16 property tax levy in excess of the levy limitation for six consecutive years, 17 commencing in 2016, for the purpose of funding prevention and early 18 intervention strategies to improve the health and well-being of children, 19 youth and their communities. The youth action plan task force members 20 helped shape the first best starts for kids levy proposition.

3. Ordinance 18088 also directed the executive to transmit to the council a
plan relating to an oversight and advisory board for the portion of the best
starts for kids levy proceeds related to children and youth strategies and a
proposed ordinance identifying the duties and composition of the
oversight and advisory board. Ordinance 18088 required that the
oversight and advisory plan be consistent with the recommendations in the
county's youth action plan.
4. In January 2016, the county enacted Ordinance 18217 establishing the
King County children and youth advisory board; and adding a new chapter
to K.C.C. Title 2A.
5. In July 2020, council adopted Motion 15673 accepting the Puget Sound
Taxpayer Accountability Account ("PSTAA") implementation plan.
PSTAA directs transit-related revenue to educational services to improve
outcomes in early learning, K-12, and post-secondary education. The
PSTAA implementation plan designated the children and youth advisory
board to establish and maintain the PSTAA advisory committee.
6. In April 2021, Ordinance 19267 submitted to the voters of King
County a proposition to renew the best starts for kids levy, providing for
resident oversight and authorizing a property tax levy in excess of the levy
limitation contained in chapter 84.55 RCW for a six-year consecutive
period, commencing in 2022, at a rate of not more than \$0.19 per one
thousand dollars of assessed valuation in the first year, and limiting annual
levy increases to three percent in the five succeeding years, all for the

44	purpose of funding prevention and early intervention strategies and a
45	capital grants program to improve the health and well-being of children,
46	youth and their communities.
47	7. In July 2021 as directed by Ordinance 19267, the Executive developed
48	and transmitted the Best Starts for Kids implementation plan for 2022-
49	2027 in consultation with the King County children and youth advisory
50	board.
51	8. Ordinance 19267 also directs the executive, by October 1, 2021, to
52	transmit to the council for consideration and adoption by ordinance a best
53	starts for kids governance update report that describes and explains
54	necessary and recommended changes to sections of the King County Code
55	and applicable ordinances that describe the composition and duties of the
56	King County children and youth advisory board.
57	9. Research shows inclusion of lived experience perspectives on boards
58	increases the efficacy of policy development, strategic planning,
59	implementation of programs, evaluation and the development of
60	innovative approaches that reach communities and effectively meet their
61	needs.
62	10. Stipends serve to provide incentive for youth participation on boards,
63	while recognizing their expertise, and helping with living expenses as they
64	engage in board activities.
65	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

66	SECTION 1. Ordinance 18217, Section 2, as amended, and K.C.C. 2A.300.510
67	are hereby amended to read as follows:
68	A. For the purposes of this section:
69	1. "Best $((s))$ Starts for $((k))$ Kids children and youth strategies" means those
70	strategies that are eligible expenditures as defined in Ordinance ( $(18088)$ ) $\underline{19267}$ ,
71	((Section 5.C.1., 2. and 4.)) Section 4.C.1. and 2., Section 4.D. and Section 4.E.;
72	2. "Collective impact" means a process for achieving meaningful and
73	sustainable progress on complex social issues that involves convening stakeholders
74	across sectors and communities, who share a common vision and a shared agenda for
75	assuring accountability and measuring results; and
76	3. "Youth Action Plan" means the Youth Action Plan approved under Motion
77	14378.
78	B. As recommended in the Youth Action Plan and as required by Ordinances
79	18088 and 19267, the King County children and youth advisory board is created to act in
80	an advisory capacity to the executive and council to:
81	1. Assist King County policy makers as they consider outcomes, policies and
82	investments for children and families and youth and young adults; and
83	2. Serve as the $((b))\underline{B}$ est $((s))$ Starts for $((k))\underline{K}$ ids children and youth strategies
84	oversight and advisory body, including making recommendations on and monitoring the
85	distributions of levy proceeds described in Ordinance ((18088)) 19267, ((Section 5.C.1.,
86	2. and 4.)) Section 4.C.1. and 2., Section 4.D. and Section 4.E.

87	C. The goal of the board is to improve the health and well-being of children and
88	youth by utilizing a collective impact model to implement strategies that focus on
89	prevention and early intervention.
90	D.1. The board shall make recommendations to the executive and county council
91	regarding children and youth services, consistent with the recommendations in the Youth
92	Action Plan.
93	2. The board shall receive and review King County outcomes and data,
94	recommending improvements and modifications to achieve outcomes and support strong
95	data collection and indicator protocols.
96	3. The board shall assist the executive and the council with the comprehensive
97	review and analysis of King County government's programs, services and outcomes for
98	children, families, youth and young adults for alignment with other initiatives and
99	coalitions that have outcomes identified for children, families, youth and young adults.
100	4. The board shall recommend policy, budget, and other findings to the
101	executive and the council, ensuring alignment with other initiatives and coalitions that
102	have outcomes identified for children, families, youth and young adults.
103	5. The board shall participate with, track and report on efforts of partnerships,
104	coalitions and networks throughout the region to inform the development of an aligned,
105	region wide response that leads to improved outcomes.
106	6. The board shall be a forum for discussion and exchange of ideas in response
107	to emergent needs, promising practices, and continuous improvement.
108	E. The board shall ((work in collaboration with the executive to develop an
109	implementation plan for)) provide oversight for the $((b))$ Best $((s))$ Starts for $((k))$ Kids

110	children and youth strategies ((to be transmitted to the council by June 1, 2016)) outlined
111	in the Best Starts for Kids implementation plan. The board shall:
112	1. ((Make recommendations for the plan consistent with Ordinance 18088;
113	2. Make recommendations for the plan so it is consistent with other adopted
114	county plans and policies such as the King County Strategic Plan, the Youth Action Plan
115	and Ordinance 16948, which transformed the county's work on equity and social justice
116	from an initiative to an integrated effort that applies the King County Strategic Plan
117	2010-2014's "fair and just" principle to all the county does in order to achieve equitable
118	opportunities for all people and communities;
119	3.)) Advise on development of indicators and targets for $((b))\underline{B}$ est $((s))$ Starts for

121	((4. Make recommendations that ensure the work of the county's steering

125	starts for kids levy proceeds; ((and
126	6. Make recommendations on an)) 3. Work in collaboration with executive staff
127	on any recommended changes to the children and youth strategies in the Best Starts for
128	Kids implementation plan; and
129	4. Consult on and review annual ((reporting process)) reports to the council and
130	community that demonstrate((s)) transparency regarding the expenditure of levy proceeds
131	and the effectiveness of the best starts for kids children and youth strategies in meeting
132	the goals and outcomes established in Ordinance ((18088)) 19267.

133	F. The board may establish standing and ad hoc work groups focusing on specific
134	components of children and youth services and $((b))\underline{B}$ est $((s))\underline{S}$ tarts for $((k))\underline{K}$ ids
135	strategies. Individuals or representative from entities whose work is closely related to
136	children and youth prevention and early intervention strategies may be invited to
137	participate in work groups as nonvoting members.
138	G. Consistent with a collective impact model, the board shall:
139	1. Review and advise the executive and council on emerging and evolving best
140	and promising practices to improve the health and well-being of children and youth;
141	2. Coordinate with other county boards and groups including, but not limited to,
142	the steering committee to address juvenile justice disproportionality, the mental illness
143	and drug dependency oversight board, the regional human services levy citizen oversight
144	board and the veterans levy citizen oversight board, to maximize the impact of the
145	county's children and youth services;
146	3. Serve as a forum to promote coordination and collaboration between entities
147	involved in improving the health and well-being of children and youth; and
148	4. Coordinate and share information with other related external efforts and
149	groups.
150	H. The board shall adopt rules governing its operations at its first meeting, which
151	may be revised in subsequent meetings.
152	I.1. The board shall be composed of not more than forty members, at least three
153	five of whom shall be youth age twenty-four or under.

154	2. As required by Ordinance 18088, the board shall be comprised of a wide
155	array of King County residents and stakeholders with geographically and culturally
156	diverse perspectives.
157	3. Members of the advisory board shall be appointed by the executive and
158	confirmed by the council.
159	J. ((The board shall establish terms of appointment by lot. ((Thirteen positions
160	shall have initial terms of two years, thirteen positions shall have initial terms of three
161	years and the remainder of the positions shall have initial terms of four years. After the
162	initial terms have expired, all t)) Terms for members of the board shall be for three years.
163	K. In accordance with K.C.C. 2.28.006, youth members aged twenty-four years
164	old and younger of the board who are neither employees of King County nor employees
165	of other municipal governments shall receive compensation. The initial compensation
166	shall be one hundred twenty-five dollars per meeting and shall not exceed one hundred
167	twenty-five dollars per month before December 31, 2022. Beginning January 1, 2023,
168	the compensation amount per meeting and the maximum compensation amount per
169	month shall be automatically adjusted annually, and every year thereafter, at the rate
170	equivalent to the twelve-month change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor
171	Statistics Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for the Seattle-Tacoma-
172	Bellevue Statistical Metropolitan Area, which is known as "the CPI-U." However, if the
173	twelve-month change in the CPI-U is negative, there shall not be an adjustment.
174	L. The board shall provide support to enable youth board members aged twenty-
