1	AN ORDINANCE related to COVID-19; making a net
2	supplemental appropriation of \$8,945,000 to several
3	general fund agencies; making a net supplemental
4	appropriation of \$141,593,000 to several non-general fund
5	agencies; making a net supplemental appropriation of
6	\$10,372,105 to several capital improvement funds;
7	amending the 2021-2022 Biennial Budget Ordinance,
8	Ordinance 19210, Sections 10, 18, 18, 43, 44, 45, 47, 48,
9	60, 60, 70, 70, 89, 89, 92, 100, 106, 111, 111, 112, 112,
10	115, 119, 121, 128, 128 and 129, as amended, and
11	Attachment A, as amended; and Ordinance 19289, Sections
12	37 and 37, as amended; and declaring an emergency.
13	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
14	SECTION 1. Findings:
15	A. On February 29, 2020, the Governor of Washington state declared a state of
16	emergency in all counties in Washington and directed that the plans and procedures of the
17	Washington State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan be implemented as a
18	result of coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-19").
19	B. COVID-19 is a respiratory disease that can result in serious illness or death
20	and can easily spread from person to person. The World Health Organization has

21 classified COVID-19 as a pandemic.

22	C. On March 1, 2020, King County executive Dow Constantine signed a
23	proclamation of emergency enabling "extraordinary measures" to respond to the COVID-
24	19 outbreak. On March 3, 2020, the council passed Motion 15610, affirming the
25	executive's proclamation of emergency.
26	D. On March 23, 2020, as a result of the continued worldwide spread of COVID-
27	19, its significant progression in Washington state, and the high risk it posed to our most
28	vulnerable populations, the Governor issued a "Stay Home - Stay Healthy" order
29	prohibiting, with limited exceptions, all people in Washington state from leaving their
30	homes or participating in social, spiritual and recreational gatherings of any kind
31	regardless of the number of participants, and required all nonessential businesses in
32	Washington state to cease operations except for performing basic minimal operations.
33	The order was extended twice, with the last extension expiring May 31, 2020.
34	E. On May 31, 2020, the Governor reiterated that a state of emergency continued
35	to exist but amended the "Stay Home - Stay Healthy" proclamation and renamed it the
36	"Safe Start - Stay Healthy" proclamation. The Governor ordered that, except as provided
37	in the phased county reopening plan, all other provisions of the state of emergency
38	remained in force.
39	F. On June 5, 2020, King County entered Modified Phase 1 of the Safe Start
40	Plan. Then, on June 19, 2020, King County entered Phase 2 of the Safe Start Plan.
41	G. On July 28, 2020, the Governor paused counties progressing in the reopening
42	phases under the state's Safe Start Plan due to continued rise of cases and spread of
43	COVID-19 statewide.

44	H. On November 15, 2020, in response to a doubling of statewide COVID-19
45	cases between late October and mid-November 2020, the Governor imposed new
46	restrictions on, among other things, indoor gatherings, dining and fitness. The Governor
47	originally ordered those restrictions to remain in place through December 14, 2020,
48	before extending the restrictions twice to apply through January 11, 2021.
49	I. On December 11, 2020, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration issued the first
50	emergency use authorization for a vaccine to prevent COVID-19, which allowed the
51	vaccine to be distributed in the United States. Days later, the first doses of the COVID-
52	19 vaccine arrived in King County, which were administered to front-line healthcare
53	workers.
54	J. Throughout 2021 and into 2022, the demand for vaccination fluctuated with
55	each new group that became vaccine eligible for either primary series or booster shots.
56	As of October 1, 2021, seventy percent of King County residents had completed their
57	vaccine series. As of May 2, 2022, the county's vaccination efforts resulted in the
58	administration of approximately 4,919,109 doses of COVID-19 vaccine.
59	K. Demand for testing and vaccination may be impacted in 2022 by several
60	variables. Testing volumes will fluctuate based on any new variant and with likely
61	seasonal increases in viral transmission. Vaccination demand will fluctuate as new
62	groups become eligible or following new booster recommendations.
63	L. On January 5, 2021, the Governor announced "Healthy Washington -
64	Roadmap to Recovery," a COVID-19 phased recovery plan. Under this plan, a region in
65	the state could move into a new phase, forward or backward, depending upon whether
66	metrics measuring the region's community disease levels and health system capacity met
63 64 65	L. On January 5, 2021, the Governor announced "Healthy Washington - Roadmap to Recovery," a COVID-19 phased recovery plan. Under this plan, a region in the state could move into a new phase, forward or backward, depending upon whether

67 state Department of Health criteria.

68	M. On May 13, 2021, Governor Inslee announced that the state was moving
69	toward full reopening on June 30, 2021, under the state Roadmap to Recovery plan. All
70	industry sectors previously covered by the plan, with some limited exceptions, were
71	permitted to return to usual capacity and operations. Public health - Seattle & King
72	County encouraged county residents to stay as vigilant as ever as the county faced more
73	contagious COVID-19 variants.

74 N. On February 17, 2022, Governor Inslee announced the state would move into 75 a less restrictive phase of the COVID-19 response. The governor announced that as of 76 March 12, 2022, the state would no longer require vaccine verification for large events 77 and as of March 21, 2022, face masks would no longer be required in most settings, 78 including K-12 schools and childcare settings. Under the governor's Proclamation 20-25, 79 businesses and local governments are still able to choose to implement vaccination or 80 face mask requirements for workers or customers, and school districts may still choose to 81 have students and teachers wear face masks.

O. As further described in this section, COVID-19 and the related preventative measures necessitated by the pandemic, including those outlined in the executive orders summarized in subsections A. through N. of this section, have caused and continue to cause extraordinary, unprecedented and devastating economic effects in King County and throughout Washington.

P. The federal government has provided the following relief in response to theCOVID-19 pandemic:

1. On March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act

90	("the CARES Act"), a \$2.2 trillion federal stimulus package, became law. The CARES
91	Act provides relief to state and local governments through a variety of federal agencies
92	and programs. Some of these relief programs apply to the county, and the county has
93	used the moneys provided by these programs to either pay or reimburse, or both pay and
94	reimburse, the county for necessary expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19
95	pandemic, including expenses preparing for, responding to, mitigating impact of and
96	preventing COVID-19;
97	2. On December 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental
98	Appropriations Act ("CRRSAA") within the 2021 Consolidated Appropriations Act
99	("CAA"), which provided an additional \$900 billion in federal stimulus, became law.
100	CRRSAA funding programs include Federal Transit Administration transit infrastructure
101	grants, the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Emergency Rental Assistance Program, and
102	the Department of Health and Human Services Public Health and Social Services
103	Emergency Fund. Several county departments are eligible to either receive or administer,
104	or both, those moneys, which recipients may use to pay for, or to reimburse, expenses
105	related to the ongoing COVID-19 health emergency. As part of CRRSAA, the U.S.
106	Department of the Treasury awarded the county Emergency Rental Assistance moneys.
107	Not less than ninety percent of awarded moneys must be used for direct financial
108	assistance, including rent, rental arrears, utilities and home energy costs arrears, and other
109	expenses related to housing. Remaining moneys are available for housing stability
110	services, including case management and other services intended to keep households
111	stably housed, and administrative costs. Moneys generally expired December 31, 2021.
112	CAA also extended the use of the CARES Act's Department of Treasury's Coronavirus

113 Relief Fund to December 31, 2021; and

114 3. On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("the ARP Act"), 115 a \$1.9 trillion federal relief package, became law. The ARP Act provides relief to state 116 and local governments, including the county, through a variety of federal agencies and 117 programs. Under Section 9901 of the APR Act, a new Section 603 is added to Title VI of 118 the Social Security Act to provide the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund 119 ("CLFRF") to mitigate the fiscal effects stemming from the pandemic with respect to 120 COVID-19. The county is receiving a direct allocation of CLFRF moneys. As provided 121 for under Section 9901, CLFRF moneys must be used: to respond to the COVID-19 122 pandemic or its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small 123 businesses and nonprofit organizations, or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, 124 travel and hospitality; to respond to workers performing essential work during the 125 COVID-19 pandemic by providing premium pay to eligible county workers who are 126 performing that essential work, or by providing grants to eligible employers that have 127 eligible workers who perform essential work; for the provision of government services to 128 the extent of the reduction in revenue of such county due to the COVID-19 pandemic 129 relative to revenues collected in the most-recent full fiscal year of the county prior to the 130 emergency; or to make necessary investments in water, sewer or broadband 131 infrastructure. 132 Q. In response to the state and county declarations of emergency, as well as 133 guidance from the local health officer and state Department of Health, the county was

required to and continues to take necessary emergency protective measures to eliminate

135 or lessen immediate threats to lives, public health and safety. These measures are directly

136	related to the emergency and include the county's response to mitigate community
137	transmissions of COVID-19. The actions taken by the county to prevent, prepare for,
138	mitigate against and respond to the pandemic are reasonable, necessary and prudent given
139	the county's needs and the information available at the time, and in accordance with
140	federal regulations and cost principles. Internal policies and procedures, including
141	procurement guidelines to support the work and expenditures made were followed. All
142	expenditures made were in carrying out the legal responsibilities of the county.
143	R. As recognized in Ordinance 19191, adopted by the council on November 10,
144	2020, communities historically disadvantaged by racism, sexism and LGBTQI+
145	discrimination have suffered disproportionate health and economic impacts from the
146	COVID-19 pandemic, and greater challenges to remaining healthy. Subsequent studies
147	and reporting reaffirm the data cited in that prior ordinance. For instance, the Centers for
148	Disease Control and Prevention, and public health - Seattle & King County have
149	continued to report that racial and ethnic minority groups are disproportionately
150	represented among COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations and deaths.
151	S. The council finds that relief is necessary for every community in the county,
152	particularly those historically disadvantaged communities, including immigrant and
153	refugee communities, that are more-adversely impacted by COVID-19 due to continuing
154	discrimination and the lingering effects of past discrimination. The council further finds
155	that, for all appropriations related to the COVID-19 pandemic included in this ordinance,
156	it is appropriate and necessary for the county to consider and address strategies, in
157	program implementation and awards or provider selections, to address those historically
158	disadvantaged communities that have been disproportionately impacted by inequities and

159	discrimination, in order to respond to the disproportionate health and economic impacts
160	described in this section. The strategies should take into account the dire need to provide
161	relief as quickly as possible during this pandemic and may include, by way of example,
162	recruitment and outreach for potential subcontractors, grant recipients and other
163	beneficiaries, as well as consideration of whether individuals and organizations are
164	members of, provide services to or are located in historically disadvantaged communities
165	in distributing limited benefits to qualified applicants.
166	T. The council finds that COVID-19 leave costs as well as payroll costs, for
167	employees dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health
168	emergency are necessary and reasonable for funding through the federal CLFRF.
169	U. The council finds that the county's judicial system has been adversely
170	impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The county superior court and district court have
171	been required to close, relocate or otherwise significantly modify, or any combination
172	thereof, their regular operations, including court services, trials and other proceedings.
173	The courts are handling cases and providing other services either virtually or socially
174	distanced, or both, including for a period at Meydenbauer Center, to the extent feasible
175	and safe and as permitted by law. Despite those efforts, criminal, juvenile offender,
176	family, dependency and guardianship, civil and other cases have been delayed by
177	necessity. Meanwhile, new cases continue to be filed, resulting in a significant backlog
178	of cases. The superior court, the district court, the department of judicial administration,
179	the prosecutor's office and the department of public defense have additional costs to
180	handle increased caseloads, case backlogs due to COVID-19 response and provide virtual
181	and socially distanced proceedings and services, including operations at the Meydenbauer

182	Center, modifications to audio and visual facilities in courthouses, additional and
183	overtime staff and additional communications and interpreter-related expenses. The
184	council therefore further finds that additional funds to pay for increased costs related to
185	staff, services and operations in superior court, district court, judicial administration,
186	prosecutor's office and public defense are appropriate to respond to the COVID-19
187	pandemic.

188 V. The council finds that the COVID-19 pandemic has intensified the risk of 189 domestic and sexual violence and increased the need for domestic and sexual violence 190 services due to, among other things, the impact of stay-at-home orders contributing to 191 social isolation, separating survivors from their support networks, reducing the time 192 survivors have away from their abusers and diminishing access to childcare services, 193 food and education, as well as increased financial stress on families that can lead to 194 violence. The pandemic also has increased the severity and number of behavioral health 195 symptoms experienced by people across the county due to far-reaching medical, 196 economic, social and political consequences. The council therefore also finds that 197 additional funds for domestic and sexual violence and behavioral health services are 198 appropriate to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and its negative economic impacts. 199 Domestic and sexual violence services may include behavioral health - trauma recovery 200 services and housing stability services utilizing the Domestic Violence Housing First 201 model to help domestic and sexual violence survivors address barriers to housing 202 stability.

W. The council finds that decreased access to childcare services and the lack or
 decrease in in-person learning for children during the COVID-19 pandemic are having

205	significant and wide-ranging adverse impacts on families, particularly lower income
206	families and those in historically disadvantaged communities. The council therefore also
207	finds that additional funds for childcare services are appropriate to respond to the
208	COVID-19 pandemic and its negative economic impacts.
209	X. The council finds that the COVID-19 pandemic and restrictions on activities
210	have slowed and, in many cases, prevent new construction projects from moving forward
211	in the county, resulting in adverse impacts on the construction industry. The emergency
212	also has resulted in delays in the county's ability to process permit applications and a
213	backlog in applications as new permits continue to be filed. The council further finds that
214	providing additional resources to significantly reduce the wait times for county permits
215	and work through the backlog of applications will allow job-creating projects to begin
216	construction more quickly and support economic recovery from the COVID-19
217	pandemic.
218	Y. The council finds that COVID-19 business process safety protocols for
219	appraisers have constrained standard field and office operations of the department of
220	assessments and that additional funds for overtime are needed to meet mandated
221	deadlines and cover the additional time it takes to complete work and to cover COVID-
222	related absences.
223	Z. The council finds that the COVID-19 pandemic and its economic impacts have
224	resulted in decreased levels of health insurance coverage for county residents, particularly
225	in historically disadvantaged communities that have been especially hard hit by both the
226	COVID-19 pandemic and the related economic downturn. Lack of insurance coverage
227	can have substantial health and economic consequences for not only individuals, but also

228	their families and communities. In January 2021, President Biden signed an executive
229	order to open up the federal health insurance marketplace through May 15, 2021, to allow
230	uninsured people to buy a plan and those who want to change their marketplace coverage
231	can do so. The council further finds that providing funds for programs to help enroll
232	people in health insurance during this enrollment period is appropriate to respond to the
233	COVID-19 pandemic and its negative economic impacts.
234	AA. The council finds that food insecurity has tripled in the county
235	since March 2020. The populations most affected by food insecurity are those that
236	experience health disparities and structural racism and discrimination, including Black,
237	Indigenous and People of Color, Latinx, immigrants and refugees, LGBTQI+
238	people, people with disabilities and people who are experiencing homelessness. In
239	response, community-based, faith-based and cultural organizations began distributing
240	culturally appropriate food, but there remains a significant unmet need. The council
241	further finds that these community organizations report a need for additional resources to
242	meet increased need during this emergency. The council further finds that additional
243	funds are needed to address food insecurity resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic and
244	its negative economic impacts, particularly in the provision of culturally appropriate
245	food.
246	BB. The council finds that residents, businesses, nonprofit organizations and
247	other organizations in the county face barriers in accessing federal, state and local grant
248	opportunities related to the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly those from historically
249	disadvantaged communities who may not have previously participated in publicly funded
250	grant programs due to ongoing discrimination and the lingering effects of past

251 discrimination. The council therefore also finds that additional funds are appropriate to

252 provide technical assistance for federal grant opportunities and to increase language

access support to allow equitable access to grant programs.

254 CC. The council finds that race- and ethnic-based discrimination and bias have 255 increased during the pandemic due to inaccurate and misleading information about the 256 source of the virus and how it spreads. The council therefore also finds that additional 257 funds to provide in-language communications on COVID-related issues and anti-hate and 258 bias response are needed to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

259 DD. The council finds that the COVID-19 pandemic has widened disparities in 260 the workforce and accelerated automation. Health and safety measures forced many 261 employers to adopt automation, resulting in the loss of entry-level and low-wage jobs like 262 retail salespersons, cashiers, bartenders and waiters. Those changes have significantly 263 impacted workers with a high school education or less, older workers, and workers from 264 historically disadvantaged communities. Disparities that existed before the pandemic, 265 especially those related to digital skills and reliable internet access, are worsening as 266 work, education and training programs are digitized. The council further finds that 267 additional moneys are needed to plan for and implement a strategy to address the future 268 of work, including training, increasing digital proficiency and access and monitoring and 269 supporting the overall workforce transition. The council further finds that investment in 270 industries adversely impacted by the pandemic and its secondary effects is necessary to 271 ensure those industries recover and to provide new and sustainable job opportunities for 272 laid off and underemployed people as quickly as possible.

EE. The council finds that public use of county parks and other facilities that

274	allow for social distancing has dramatically increased throughout the COVID-19
275	pandemic. The council therefore also finds that additional funds for the department of
276	natural resources and parks are appropriate to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.
277	FF. The council finds that for the appropriations included in this ordinance that
278	are related to the COVID-19 pandemic the executive will utilize a comprehensive and
279	detailed cost recovery and funding optimization framework to inform the best use of the
280	various revenue sources including, but not limited to, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and
281	Economic Security Act, also known as the CARES Act, the Coronavirus Response and
282	Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, also known as the CRRSAA, the American
283	Rescue Plan Act of 2021, also known as the ARP Act, the Federal Emergency
284	Management Agency, state funding and local funding. This includes applying strategic
285	consideration on the flexibility of funding source, documentation, and administrative
286	effort of cost recovery.
287	GG. On April 11, 2021, Michael Colmant, deputy director of the airport division
288	passed away from a fatal hit-and-run incident while riding his bicycle along Seward Park
289	Avenue South in the city of Seattle. As of July 14, 2021, the person or persons
290	responsible for the hit-and-run death of Michael Colmant have not been identified. The
291	council finds that RCW 10.85.030 expressly allows a county legislative authority, in its
292	discretion, to offer and pay a reward relating to the commission of a crime.
293	HH. The council has authority to enact an emergency appropriation ordinance as
294	set forth in Section 470.20 of the King County Charter.
295	SECTION 2. Ordinance 19210, Section 10, as amended, is hereby amended as
296	follows:

297	KING COUNTY CIVIC TELEVISION – From the general fund there is hereby
298	appropriated to:
299	King County civic television \$50,000
300	SECTION 3. Ordinance 19210, Section 18, as amended, is hereby amended as
301	follows:
302	OFFICE OF PERFORMANCE, STRATEGY AND BUDGET - From the general
303	fund there is hereby disappropriated from:
304	Office of performance, strategy and budget (\$500,000)
305	SECTION 4. The council directs that section 3 of this ordinance takes effect
306	before section 5 of this ordinance.
307	SECTION 5. Ordinance 19210, Section 18, as amended, is hereby amended as
308	follows:
309	OFFICE OF PERFORMANCE, STRATEGY AND BUDGET - From the general
310	fund there is hereby appropriated to:
311	Office of performance, strategy and budget \$800,000
312	ER1 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:
313	Of this appropriation, \$10,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely for the
314	executive to contract with the Evans School of Public Policy and Governance at the
315	University of Washington to conduct an independent retrospective analysis of the impacts
316	of coronavirus disease 2019 as described in Motion 15682. The analysis shall include,
317	but not be limited to, the health, economic and social impacts of coronavirus disease 2019
318	and the actions taken by King County leaders and public health - Seattle & King County
319	to respond to the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic and limit the spread of the virus.

320	During contract negotiations, the executive may negotiate access to public health and
321	executive branch leaders in order to prioritize the ongoing pandemic response. The
322	analysis should be conducted by graduate students using publicly available data and
323	resources and commence in January 2021.
324	ER2 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:
325	Of this appropriation, \$200,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
326	contract with the Pike Place Market Preservation and Development Authority for the
327	Alaskan Way and Western Access Improvements Elevator Replacement Project.
328	ER4 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:
329	Of this appropriation, \$20,000,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely for a
330	relief program, administered by the office of performance, strategy and budget, to
331	provide grants to arts, culture, heritage and science organizations that shall include, but
332	not be limited to, independent live music venues, independent theaters and organizations
333	that provide facilities for after-school programs. The program shall include, but not be
334	limited to, the following requirements:
335	A. For grants that shall support projects to prepare facilities for reopening and
336	financial assistance due to business interruptions from fewer attendees and fewer events
337	due to the COVID-19 pandemic, grant amounts shall be based on the number of attendees
338	and number of events during pre-COVID-19 pandemic levels compared to estimated
339	number of attendees of future events and estimated number of future events;
340	B. Grants shall not support projects and financial assistance before the adoption
341	of Ordinance 19289;

342	C. The office of performance, strategy and budget shall implement strategies to
343	ensure that the moneys encumbered in this Expenditure Restriction ER4 are awarded
344	broadly to as many organizations as feasible and also be available to smaller
345	organizations that may not have access to or have the resources to apply to state and
346	federal COVID-19 relief assistance; and
347	D. The office of performance, strategy and budget shall establish a mechanism to
348	incorporate feedback from all nine councilmembers before awarding grants.
349	ER5 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:
350	Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
351	contract with an organization that serves as a convener with entities located in the city of
352	Seattle's downtown area and provides cleaning, safety, concierge and outreach services
353	throughout the city of Seattle's downtown area. The contract shall support economic
354	recovery activities in response to the COVID-19 pandemic in the city of Seattle's
355	downtown area.
356	ER6 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:
357	Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to issue a
358	request for proposals, and to manage and pay a contractor to conduct a study using arial
359	technology to estimate fugitive landfill emissions from the Cedar Hills regional landfill in
360	accordance with priority action GHG 3.20.4 in the King County 2020 Strategic Climate
361	Action Plan, which was adopted by Motion 15866.
362	ER7 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:
363	Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract

364 with Crime Stoppers of Puget Sound to provide up to a \$50,000 reward to any person or

365	5 persons providing information leading to the arrest and convi	ction of the person or
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366 persons responsible for the hit-and-run death of county employee Michael Colmant,

367 consistent with applicable state law.

368 ER8 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

369 Of this appropriation, \$250,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to

370 contract with a nonprofit organization that collects, tests and distributes blood to hospitals

in the county. The contract shall support efforts to secure blood and related supplies,

372 which have declined due to the COVID-19 pandemic and support efforts to expand

awareness and participation in historically disadvantaged communities.

374 ER9 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

375 Of this appropriation, \$160,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to award

376 grants to cornea tissue donation transplant providers in King County for COVID-19-

377 related increased costs resulting from business interruptions and implementations of

378 COVID-19 mitigation measure to ensure continued tissue donation and recovery

operations.

380 ER10 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

381 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 <u>of general fund revenues</u> shall be expended or

382 encumbered solely to contract with the Andy Hill Cancer Research Endowment (CARE)

383 Fund to address health disparities in King County that have been exacerbated due to the

- 384 COVID-19 pandemic and to establish a more equitable workforce in the health care
- 385 industry in King County. The appropriation encumbered in this Expenditure Restriction

The assessment shall be designed to indicate whether undiluted wastewater effluent represents a potential source of deleterious toxic influence to Puget Sound marine organisms, and to Southern Resident Orcas and the hierarchy of marine species upon which they depend particularly; E. The evaluation shall include an assessment of the accumulation of those toxic

1482	elements in marine organisms, either directly or through bioaccumulation, and shall
1483	discuss potential impacts on metabolic processes, behavior and mortality. The
