### Ordinance 19506

**Proposed No.** 2022-0345.1 **Sponsors** Upthegrove 1 AN ORDINANCE revising and updating the Council-2 designated portion of Round 5 of the WaterWorks program; 3 and amending Ordinance 19353, Section 2. 4 STATEMENT OF FACTS: 5 1. District 5 has requested to revise its project selection for the Council-6 designated portion of the Round 5 project round of the King County 7 WaterWorks grant program authorized in Ordinance 19353, as regards the 8 "Expanding Rainwater Catchment and Community Education Work at 9 Paradise Parking Plots" project. District 5 has identified an appropriate 10 alternative project to be funded at the same level, referred to as the "Kent-11 Meridian High School Rain Garden Project." 12 2. District 1 has requested to revise its project selection for the council-13 designated portion of WaterWorks Round 5, replacing "Forterra" as the 14 project sponsor of the "Thornton Creek Noxious Weeds Knockout 15 Project" with an alternate project sponsor, "EarthCorps." 16 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY: 17 SECTION 1. Ordinance 19353, Section 2, is hereby amended to read as follows: 18 The King County council authorizes funding of WaterWorks projects 19 recommended by the council for Round 5, 2021, totaling \$2,671,000, as follows: 20 A.
