| 14 | BE IT ORDAINED BY THE O | COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY: |
| 15 | SECTION 1. Findings: | |
| 16 | A. In a democratic society, eff | ective civilian oversight of law enforcement is |
| 17 | essential. To protect the fundamental f | reedoms of all citizens, police are granted the |
| 18 | power to detain and use force against s | some individuals, but there is potential for that |
| 19 | power to be abused. Civilian oversight | is a safeguard against such abuse. |
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| 20 | B. The creation and maintenance of an independent civilian office of law | |
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| 21 | enforcement oversight is a crucial means of assuring integrity, transparency and | |
| 22 | accountability in law enforcement and of fostering community trust in, and respect and | |
| 23 | support for, the King County sheriff and the department of public safety. | |
| 24 | C. By its independent and objective review, a civilian office of law enforcement | |
| 25 | oversight serves not only to identify police misconduct when it has occurred, but also to | |
| 26 | reassure citizens and maintain the positive reputations of law enforcement officers when | |
| 27 | allegations of misconduct are unfounded. | |
| 28 | D. To be effective, an office of law enforcement oversight must, at a minimum, | |
| 29 | have authority to investigate, review, and analyze: complaints about the conduct of law | |
| 30 | enforcement officers; incidents involving the use of force by county law enforcement | |
| 31 | officers; and internal investigations conducted, and any resulting disciplinary action | |
| 32 | taken, by the King County sheriff and the department of public safety regarding the | |
| 33 | conduct of county law enforcement officers that is related to those complaints or | |
| 34 | incidents. The authority of the office should also include the preparation and publication | |
| 35 | of findings, conclusions and recommendations related to the office's oversight of the | |
| 36 | department of public safety. | |

E. An additional vital function of an office of law enforcement oversight is to reach out to the community, listening and responding to questions and concerns that are raised and helping to foster communication and understanding between the community and the King County sheriff's office.

F. To do its job, an office of law enforcement oversight must have timely accessto all relevant information.

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43 G. To exercise independent judgment, the director of an office of law enforcement oversight must not fear removal from office prior to expiration of the 44 director's term of office, except for cause by a majority vote of the county council. 45 H. Civilian oversight of law enforcement is a fundamental principle that should 46 be enshrined in the King County Charter. 47 I. The county council has already established by ordinance a civilian office of 48 law enforcement oversight in chapter 2.75 of the King County Code and a citizens' 49 advisory committee on law enforcement oversight in K.C.C. 2.36.050. This proposed 50 charter amendment is not intended to dissolve those entities or to require readoption of 51 existing code provisions that are consistent with this proposed amendment, but rather is 52 intended to provide the office and the committee with a foundation in the county Charter 53 54 as well as the county code and to set forth the essential authority of the office and the committee. 55 J. K.C.C. chapter 1.10 provides for the publication and distribution of local voters 56 pamphlets in conformity with the provisions of chapter 29A.32 RCW for elections held in 57 King County. 58 K. RCW 29A.32.280 provides that for each measure from a jurisdiction that is 59 included in a local voters pamphlet, the legislative authority of that jurisdiction shall 60 formally appoint a committee to prepare arguments advocating voter approval of the 61 62 measure and a committee to prepare arguments advocating voter rejection of the measure. SECTION 2. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of King County for 63

64 their approval and ratification or rejection at a special election to be held in conjunction

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with the general election on November 3, 2015, the addition of a new Section 265 to the
King County Charter, as follows:

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Section 265. Office of Law Enforcement Oversight.

The county council shall establish by ordinance an office of law enforcement oversight, which shall be a part of the legislative branch. The office shall have a director who is appointed by a majority of the county council to serve a term of four years and until a successor is appointed. The director may be removed from office at any time for cause by a majority of the county council.

73 The authority of the office of law enforcement oversight shall be prescribed by ordinance and shall include investigation, review, and analysis of: complaints about the 74 conduct of law enforcement officers; incidents involving the use of force by county law 75 76 enforcement officers; and internal investigations conducted, and any resulting disciplinary action taken, by the department of public safety regarding the conduct of 77 county law enforcement officers that is related to those complaints or incidents. The 78 authority of the office shall also include: the preparation and publication of findings, 79 conclusions and recommendations related to the office's oversight of the sheriff's office 80 and community outreach concerning the sheriff's office and the office of law 81 enforcement oversight. 82

To enable the office of law enforcement oversight to exercise its authority effectively, the office shall be authorized by ordinance to obtain all relevant information, including authority to review and copy relevant department of public safety files, inspect crime scenes, conduct interviews and participate in internal investigations and review hearings.

| 88 | An advisory committee for law enforcement oversight is established to review, | |
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| 89 | advise and report on the office of law enforcement oversight in a manner that may be | |
| 90 | prescribed by ordinance. The committee shall also advise the sheriff and the council on | |
| 91 | matters of equity and social justice related to law enforcement. The committee may also | |
| 92 | advise the sheriff and the council on systemic problems and opportunities for | |
| 93 | improvement in the law enforcement practices of the department of public safety. The | |
| 94 | county council shall prescribe by ordinance the committee's membership, qualifications, | |
| 95 | and rules and procedures, and the process for appointment of committee members, and | |
| 96 | may prescribe by ordinance additional duties of the committee. | |
| 97 | SECTION 3. Call for special election. In accordance with RCW 29A.04.321, | |
| 98 | the King County council hereby calls for a special election to be held in conjunction with | |
| 99 | the general election on November 3, 2015, to consider a charter amendment as described | |
| 100 | in this ordinance. The King County director of elections shall cause notice to be given of | |
| 101 | this ordinance in accordance with the state constitution and general law and to submit to | |
| 102 | the qualified electors of the county, at the said special county election, the proposition | |
| 103 | hereinafter set forth. The clerk of the council shall certify that proposition to the King | |
| 104 | County director of elections in substantially the following form, with such additions, | |
| 105 | deletions or modifications as may be required by the prosecuting attorney: | |
| 106 | Shall the King County Charter be amended to establish a charter-based civilian | |
| 107 | office of law enforcement oversight to investigate complaints about law | |
| 108 | enforcement conduct and the use of force by the King County sheriff and the | |
| 109 | department of public safety, to provide the office with appropriate authority to | |

- 110 carry out its duties, and to establish a charter-based citizen advisory committee on111 law enforcement oversight?
- 112 <u>SECTION 4.</u> The director of the records, elections and licensing services division
- is hereby authorized and requested to prepare and distribute a local voters pamphlet,
- 114 pursuant to K.C.C. 1.10.010, for the special election called for in this ordinance, the cost
- of the pamphlet to be included as part of the cost of the special election.
- 116 <u>SECTION 5.</u> Pursuant to RCW 29A.32.280, the following individuals are
- appointed to serve on the voters pamphlet committees, each committee to write a
- statement for or against the proposed levy:
