1	AN ORDINANCE approving the grant funding allocation	
2	for the projects funded through the WaterWorks grant	
3	program, Round 3, in accordance with the 2017-2018	
4	Biennial Budget Ordinance, Ordinance 18409, Section 113	
5	and Ordinance 18261.	
6	STATEMENT OF FACTS:	
7	1. Ordinance 18031, amended by Ordinance 18261, established the grant	
8	award criteria and process for the WaterWorks grant program in	
9	accordance with the 2015/2016 Biennial Budget Ordinance, Ordinance	
10	17941, Section 110, Proviso P2.	
11	2. The 2017-2018 Biennial Budget Ordinance 18409, Section 113	
12	appropriated funding for the WaterWorks grant program.	
13	3. Attachment A to Ordinance 18261 contains the implementation	
14	guidelines for the WaterWorks grant program, including the project	
15	criteria, eligibility, project selection process and administration of grants.	
16	The implementation guidelines provide for a grant ranking committee to	
17	review, rank and recommend projects for funding and for the wastewater	
18	treatment division of the department of natural resources and parks to	
19	administer and staff the program.	

20	4. As described in Attachment A to Ordinance 18261, projects approved
21	for funding must meet eligibility criteria for water quality improvements,
22	and the grant ranking committee is to review, rank and recommend to the
23	King County executive the projects to be approved for funding, based
24	upon the eligibility criteria and ability of the applicants to demonstrate
25	water quality benefits and implementation strength.
26	5. The grant ranking committee convened seven times in 2017 and 2018
27	to review and rank grant proposals, and has recommended funding for the
28	projects listed in section 1 of this ordinance, based upon the eligibility
29	criteria, water quality benefits and implementation strength.
30	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
31	SECTION 1. The King County council authorizes the funding of WaterWorks
32	projects for Round 3, 2017, totaling \$1,860,000, as follows:
