| 7 | 1. Ordinance 18031, amended by Ordinance 18261, established the grant |
| 8 | award criteria and process for the WaterWorks grant program in |
| 9 | accordance with the 2015/2016 Biennial Budget Ordinance, Ordinance |
| 10 | 17941, Section 110, Proviso P2. |
| 11 | 2. The 2017-2018 Biennial Budget Ordinance 18409, Section 113 |
| 12 | appropriated funding for the WaterWorks grant program. |
| 13 | 3. Attachment A to Ordinance 18261 contains the implementation |
| 14 | guidelines for the WaterWorks grant program, including the project |
| 15 | criteria, eligibility, project selection process and administration of grants. |
| 16 | The implementation guidelines provide for a grant ranking committee to |
| 17 | review, rank and recommend projects for funding and for the wastewater |
| 18 | treatment division of the department of natural resources and parks to |
| 19 | administer and staff the program. |

| 20 | 4. As described in Attachment A to Ordinance 18261, projects approved |

| 21 | for funding must meet eligibility criteria for water quality improvements, |
| 22 | and the grant ranking committee is to review, rank and recommend to the |
| 23 | King County executive the projects to be approved for funding, based |
| 24 | upon the eligibility criteria and ability of the applicants to demonstrate |
| 25 | water quality benefits and implementation strength. |
| 26 | 5. The grant ranking committee convened seven times in 2017 and 2018 |
| 27 | to review and rank grant proposals, and has recommended funding for the |
| 28 | projects listed in section 1 of this ordinance, based upon the eligibility |
| 29 | criteria, water quality benefits and implementation strength. |
| 30 | BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY: |
| 31 | SECTION 1. The King County council authorizes the funding of WaterWorks |
| 32 | projects for Round 3, 2017, totaling \$1,860,000, as follows: |
