2	On page 1, beginning on line 7, strike everything through page 7, line 138, and insert:					
3	"WHEREAS, the most recent available Washington state Department of Health					
4	data show that firearms are the third leading cause of injury-related death in Washington					
5	state, killing approximately six hundred twenty-five Washington residents each year					
6	between 2009 to 2013, and firearms were involved in one in six of all deaths among					
7	youth ages fifteen to twenty-four, and					
8	WHEREAS, the Washington state Department of Health data also show that one					
9	hundred forty-six King County residents died from a gun injury in 2015 including six					
10	children age seventeen and younger. Statewide, thirty-nine children, who are age					
11	seventeen and younger, died as a result of firearms that same year. That is the equivalent					
12	of a child or teen being killed by gunfire every nine days. King County children					
13	represent fifteen percent of all children killed as a result of firearms statewide, and					
14	WHEREAS, between 2013 and 2015, the Washington state Department of Health					
15	data show that twenty-five youth, age seventeen and younger, died by suicide in King					
16	County, of which seven used firearms. Statewide, one hundred eighteen youth died by					
17	suicide in Washington and forty-seven of these youth died from firearm suicide. King

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County youth represent twenty-one percent of youth suicide and fifteen percent of suicide

from firearm statewide, and

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20 WHEREAS, the Washington state Department of Health data also indicate that 21 ninety-five King County residents were hospitalized for nonfatal firearm injuries. 22 including nine youth, age seventeen and younger, in 2015. Statewide, three hundred 23 eight Washington state residents were hospitalized for nonfatal firearm injuries in 2015, including thirty children under eighteen years old. King County residents represent thirty 24 percent of all nonfatal firearm injuries statewide and approximately thirty percent of all 25 26 nonfatal firearm injuries among children, and 27 WHEREAS, the January 21, 2014 Annals of Internal Medicine report finds that 28 adolescents, between the ages of ten and nineteen years, with access to firearms are 2.6 29 times as likely to die by suicide as adolescents without access to firearms, and 30 -WHEREAS, the December 2008 Journal of Adolescent Health study of 31 adolescent (between the ages of ten and nineteen years) suicides by firearm found that over half were carried out with firearms from the adolescent's home. More than seventy-32 33 five percent of firearms used in suicide attempts and unintentional injuries were stored in 34 the residence of the victim, a relative, or friend, and 35 WHEREAS, according to Public Health - Seattle & King County's ongoing analysis, monitoring and dissemination of data on firearm violence in King County, 36 firearm violence has a disproportionate impact on communities of color and children of 37 color are victims of homicide by firearms at a higher rate than white children in King County, and WHEREAS, the Washington state Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System estimated thirty-four percent of Washington adults eighteen years and older, which is one

million eight hundred twenty-five thousand people, reported having a firearm in or
around their home in 2015. Just under half of these adults, which is forty-six percent or
eight hundred thirty-nine thousand people, reported having an unlocked firearm. Access
to firearms, including storage practices, are a known risk factor for firearm suicide -
especially among youth age seventeen and younger, and
WHEREAS, only twenty weeks into 2018, there have already been at least
twenty-one shootings on elementary, middle and high school and college campuses in the
United States, which averages to about 1.1 per week, and those shootings include a
February 14 shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida,
and a May 18 shooting at Santa Fe High School in Santa Fe, Texas, and
WHEREAS, in the past five years, eight school shootings have occurred in
Washington state, four of which resulted in injury or death, and
WHEREAS, during the 2015-2016 school year, the Washington state
Superintendent of Public Instruction reported one hundred thirty incidents involving a
firearm on school premises, transportation systems or school facilities, which resulted in
sixty-two suspensions and thirty expulsions and, of these, twenty-one suspensions and
fifteen expulsions were in school districts located in King County, and
WHEREAS, according to the Washington State Healthy Youth Survey, in 2016,
eleven percent of eighth-grade students, sixteen percent of tenth-grade students and
twenty-three percent of twelfth-grade students in King County reported that they would
not be caught if they carried a handgun without parental permission, and
WHEREAS, according to the Washington State Healthy Youth Survey, in 2016,
four percent of King County tenth-grade and twelfth-grade students reported having

66	WHEREAS, gun violence, and threats of gun violence, in schools undermine the		
67	sense of security that all students should have in their learning environments, and

73	WHEREAS, local governments in Washington state have taken steps that work to		
74	increase gun safety, including encouraging safe firearm storage through the LOK-IT-UP		
75	program and enforcement of extreme risk protection orders in King County, and		
76	WHEREAS, regulatory gaps created by inaction at the state level remain,		
77	resulting in innovative efforts by local government being stymied and impeded by the		
78	state's preemption laws, and		
79	WHEREAS, sensible gun safety legislation will strengthen protections for King		
80	County youth and young adults by reducing injury and death from intentional and		
81	unintentional shootings, and		
82	WHEREAS, the 2015 City of Seattle Youth Violence Prevention Needs		
83	Assessment report found that engaging and receiving consultation from youth and		
84	families who are most impacted by violence is necessary to identify strategies to address		
85	systemic issues of violence amongst youth and young adults;		
86	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:		
87	A. The executive is requested to engage and collaborate with King County

The executive should engage and collaborate with King County youth and 91 young adults that are either at-risk of or have experience with the issue of gun violence. C. The youth and young adult report should include, but not be limited to, the 96 following: 97 1. A comprehensive inventory of existing county programs that focus on youth 98 violence prevention and intervention and other community-based efforts in the county, 99 such as Best Starts for Kids, Community Correction, Juvenile Justice Data and the Family Intervention and Restorative Services Program, which is also known as FIRS, 100 101 Gang Violence Intervention and Prevention initiatives and the Gun Violence Prevention 102 Initiative; and 2. Methods and findings from the interviews and focus groups with youth, 103 young adults, their families and providers who work with youth and their families on 104 105 issues related to gun violence. 106 E. The youth and young adult report should inform recommendations and 107 strategies to prevent youth and young adult gun violence. F. The executive should present the findings in the youth and young adult report 108 109 to the following: 110 1. Youth, young adults and their family members who participated in focus

111	groups, interviews and community meetings;
112	2. The King County Gun Violence Prevention and Intervention Committee that
113	includes representatives of law enforcement, civic groups and the King County
114	prosecuting attorney's office;
115	3. Existing county programs that focus on youth violence prevention and
116	intervention and other community-based efforts in the county that impact youth and
117	young adults such as Best Starts for Kids and Zero Youth Detention;
118	4. The juvenile justice equity steering committee; and
119	5. Other county committee or task force charged with developing
120	recommendations and strategies to prevent youth and young adult gun violence.
121	G. The executive should develop recommendations on how the county can
122	support and strengthen community-based organizations' efforts to curb gun violence.
123	H. The executive should develop a final comprehensive report that includes the
124	youth and young adult report and the recommendations as mentioned in sections E. and
125	G. of this motion and transmit the report, and a motion accepting the report, by October
126	1, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy to the clerk of the council,
127	who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the
128	council chief of staff, the policy staff director and the lead staff for the committee of the
129	whole, or its successor."
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131	EFFECT: The striking amendment would do the following:
132	 Specify that the 'youth and young adult' report would include the
133	comprehensive inventory of existing county programs that focus on youth

134	violence prevention and intervention and other community-based efforts in
135	the county, and the methods and findings from the engagement with youth
136	young adults, and their families, and that report would inform the
137	recommendations on how the county can support and strengthen
138	community-based organizations' efforts to curb gun violence;
139	• Specify that the final comprehensive report that will be transmitted to the
140	council would include the youth and young adult report and the
141	recommendations that were informed by the youth and young adult report;
142	• Extend the due date of the comprehensive report to October 1, 2019; and
143	• Make technical corrections informed by Public Health – Seattle & King
