



Introduction

- Today's update reflects progress made towards METRO CONNECTS, using existing policy, on three areas: service, RapidRide, capital
- In the future, the mobility framework, regional planning effort, and related policy updates will help further align our policies and center them on equity and sustainability.

2019-20 Service Investments

March 2019

- Relocation of buses from Downtown Seattle Transit Tunnel
- More than 7,000 hours added to reduce overcrowding and improve reliability


September 2019

- More than 17,000 hours added to reduce overcrowding, improve reliability, and grow the system
- 50,000 added service hours through Seattle Transportation Benefit District

2019-20 Mobility Projects


North Eastside (March 2020)

- Legislation has been transmitted to King County Council
- Proposed changes include:
 - Integration with Link light rail at UW Station
 - New flexible mobility services (community van, community ride)
 - Improved connections between
 Eastside and north shore communities



2019-20 Mobility Projects


- Renton-Kent-Auburn (Fall 2020)
 - Ongoing outreach and engagement
 - Emphasis on historically disadvantaged communities
 - Proposed changes could include:
 - Redesign of fixed-route service
 - New flexible services
 - Set alignment and station locations for RapidRide I Line (launches 2023)



Upcoming Mobility Projects

North Link Connections (2021)

- Link Light rail expansion to
 Northgate with three new stations
- Service change stakeholder & public outreach beginning June 2019
- Service area encompasses up to ¼
 of all current Metro service hours



Community Connections

Program Status

- 24 projects underway in 26 cities and unincorporated King County
- Three mobility projects plus five additional projects in planning
 - Kent Industrial Valley
 - Redmond
 - Seaview/Sunset Hill
 - Skyway
 - Tukwila


RapidRide Network Map


Part of a high capacity Countywide transit network

RapidRide carries 66,000 passengers each day







RapidRide Expansion Timeline





Speed & Reliability Investments

Core Network – 4 projects nearing completion

- Seattle Center Capitol Hill (Route 8)
- Kent Southcenter Downtown (Route 150)
- Kirkland Redmond Bellevue (Route 245)
- Columbia Way (multiple routes)

Future Network – 3 projects underway (planning)

- Covington-Kent-SeaTac
- Overlake-Kirkland-Kenmore
- Harrison Street

Spot Improvements

- 5 projects in 3 cities finished in 2019
- 18 projects in 6 cities underway (planning)





Transit Hubs and Access

Transit Hubs


- Montlake Hub nearing completion (2020)
- Developing program for system-wide hubs and transit centers

Transit Access

- Eastgate Mobility Hub
 - Planning to start Q3
- Bicycle Parking
 - Multiple locations in design/permitting
- Safe Routes to Transit
 - 2 projects nearly complete (Redmond, Federal Way)
 - 2 projects under construction (Seattle, Skyway)

Operational Capacity Growth

- Expand base capacity 40% by 2040 (From 1,525 to 2,145 buses)
- Support conversion to 100% zero emissions fleet
- Focus Areas for Growth & Expansion
 - Central Campus (Seattle): Reconfigure & Expand
 - South Campus (Tukwila): Interim base, new South Annex
 - New Base (South King County): New permanent base



Operational Capacity - Interim Base



- 125 bus base to support nearterm growth
- Update parking garage for employees
- Demolition complete
- Construction begins later in 2019
- Ready for operations Fall 2020
- Electric charging will follow later

Zero Emissions - Eastgate



- 3rd charger installed 2019
- Allows opportunity charging
 - Additional battery buses for routes 226 and 241

State of Good Repair

- Significant portion of 6 year CIP (\$300m)
- Ensure Metro's Assets are maintained:
 - Site and Paving: Paving & lighting at Metro Facilities & P&Rs, fueling tanks and systems
 - Equipment: Furniture, radio equipment, shelters
 - Building Envelope: Roofs, doors, windows
 - Building Systems: HVAC, bus wash, fire alarms
 - Infrastructure
- 19/20 includes a more comprehensive approach
