1 **AMENDMENT TO STRIKING AMENDMENT S1 TO PROPOSED ORDINANCE**

2 **2020-0383, VERSION 1**

3 On page 58, strike line 1311 and insert:

4 "Public health \$5,376,000

5 ER1 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

6 Of this appropriation, \$35,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
7 reimburse the department of human resources for the cost of assigning two Ruth Woo
8 fellows, as described in K.C.C. 3.12.184, for three to four months to public health -
9 Seattle & King County.

10 ER2 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

11 Of this appropriation, \$120,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
12 purchase human papillomavirus vaccines for uninsured clients receiving family planning
13 and primary care at public health - Seattle & King County clinics, who are nineteen
14 through twenty-six years old.

15 ER3 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

16 Of this appropriation, \$335,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
17 support 1.0 FTE to expand the "HPV Vaccine Peer Champion" program to increase
18 knowledge and acceptance of human papillomavirus vaccines among parents/guardians

19 and youth in the county.

20 ER4 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

21 Of this appropriation, \$180,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
22 support the development of a report on gun violence among youth and young adults as
23 requested by Motion 15234, including one term-limited temporary employee position.

24 ER5 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

25 Of this appropriation, \$299,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
26 support the following: (1) one temporary term limited position to support the community
27 support program in parent child health and support activities related to redesign of parent
28 child health; and (2) one temporary term limited position to support implementation of a
29 software system for Women, Infants, and Children in parent child health.

30 ER6 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

31 Of this appropriation, \$4,830,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
32 support a food security assistance program in response to increase of demand for food
33 assistance as a result of the COVID-19 public health emergency. All grants awarded
34 pursuant to this Expenditure Restriction ER6 shall be awarded through a competitive
35 process and shall require the grantees to provide to program recipients options to acquire
36 culturally appropriate foods that may be difficult to secure through traditional stores. The
37 program shall be required to consider and address strategies, in the grant program's
38 implementation and the grant program's grant awards or provider selections, to address
39 those historically disadvantaged communities that have been disproportionately impacted
40 by inequities and discrimination.

41 ER7 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

42 Of this appropriation, \$250,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
43 support outreach activities related to COVID-19, including, but not limited to, advertising
44 in ethnic media outlets to increase messaging of public health notices and advisories to
45 populations disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. Public health - Seattle & King
46 County shall purchase advertisements directly from media outlets and shall not make
47 purchases through any third-party organizations.

48 ER8 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

49 Of this appropriation, \$3,000,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
50 provide public health emergency assistance to low-income individuals who, through the
51 county's public health COVID-19 testing, tracing, isolation and quarantine program, have
52 been identified as exposed to COVID-19 or are experiencing symptoms related to or have
53 tested positive for COVID-19 and need to isolate.

54 ER9 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

55 Of this appropriation, \$650,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
56 contract with community partners for administration, flu vaccine supply and vaccine
57 clinics to serve the increased demand due to COVID-19 among communities
58 disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and to provide support for a
59 public health nurse to assist at county isolation and quarantine sites, assessment and
60 recovery sites and shelter deintensification sites to assist with flu vaccinations.

61 ER10 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

62 Of this appropriation, \$100,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to
63 develop a community outreach plan to communicate access to and availability of the
64 COVID-19 vaccine or vaccines, once the vaccine or vaccines are available, to individuals

65 who face barriers to accessing digital services during this period when there is an
66 increased reliance on the Internet to access public information and resources available
67 related to the COVID-19 pandemic including, but not limited to seniors, rural residents,
68 limited-English-proficient residents, unemployed residents and individuals experiencing
69 homelessness and to historically disadvantaged communities such as Black,
70 Hispanic/Latinx, Indigenous and other Communities of Color that are disproportionately
71 impacted by COVID-19.

72 P1 PROVIDED THAT:

73 Of this appropriation, \$465,000 shall not be expended or encumbered for the
74 "Place-Based Communities: Original COO Sites" sub-strategy within the "Places:
75 Awards to Community Partnerships" Communities of Opportunity strategy area as
76 described in Section VII (Communities of Opportunity) of the Best Starts for Kids
77 Implementation Plan, approved by Ordinance 18373, until the executive transmits a 2018
78 outcomes report on the original place-based sites, which are Rainier Valley, White Center
79 and SeaTac/Tukwila, and a motion that should approve the report and reference the
80 subject matter, the proviso's ordinance, ordinance section and proviso number in both the
81 title and body of the motion, and a motion approving an outcomes report is passed by the
82 council.

83 The report shall include, but not be limited to:

84 A. A list of services provided through Communities of Opportunity King County
85 service agreements by each of the three original place-based sites and their partners in
86 2018, as well as the number of persons served by each site or the site's partners. The list
87 should identify the services by the issue areas of housing, economic opportunity, health

88 or community connections, as well as identify if the services were provided by the
89 original place-based site or its partners;

90 B. A summary of the priority strategies developed by the place-based sites for
91 2018 and outcomes achieved in 2018 towards those priority strategies; and

92 C. A summary of any developed performance measures for the "Place-Based
93 Communities: Original COO Sites" sub-strategy or performance measures monitoring
94 methodology for tracking outcomes data.

95 The executive should file the report and the motion required by this proviso by
96 June 30, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the
97 council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all
98 councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the health, housing and
99 human services committee, or its successors.

100 P2 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

101 Of this appropriation, \$250,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the
102 executive transmits a plan to achieve United States Department of Health and Human
103 Services's Healthy People 2020 target of eighty percent human papillomavirus (HPV)
104 vaccine series completion of county residents between thirteen and fifteen years old and a
105 motion that should acknowledge receipt of the plan and reference the subject matter, the
106 proviso's ordinance, ordinance section and proviso number in both the title and body of
107 the motion and a motion acknowledging receipt of the plan is passed by the council.

108 The plan shall include, but not be limited to:

109 A. Funding options that should evaluate both existing and new revenue sources;

110 B. Strategies to collaborate and coordinate with various stakeholders including

111 schools, health care providers, hospitals, community organizations, local jurisdictions and
112 state agencies;

113 C. Identification of potential challenges and plans to mitigate those challenges;
114 and

115 D. A timeline for achieving eighty percent vaccination of county residents
116 between thirteen and fifteen years old.

117 The executive should file the plan and a motion required by this proviso by June
118 30, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the
119 council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all
120 councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the health, housing and
121 human services committee, or its successor.

122 P3 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

123 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the
124 executive transmits a report on a Phase One plan to implement a regional health plan
125 pilot program that would provide health care to low-income county residents who are not
126 eligible to access health care through public programs such as Medicaid, Medicare and
127 subsidized health insurance under the Affordable Care Act.

128 The report shall include:

129 A. Complete demographic analysis of the 2019, or the latest year of which data
130 are available, uninsured population, disaggregated based on age, gender, race and
131 ethnicity, household poverty status and city of residence;

132 B. Assessment of the legal and regulatory considerations of establishing a pilot
133 program;

134 C. Options for a "buy in" or similar program to provide health coverage for low-
135 income county residents;

136 D. Potential eligibility requirements for the pilot program;

137 E. Financial analysis and funding options that should evaluate both existing and
138 new revenue sources; and

139 F. Recommendation on whether to proceed with Phase Two and what resources
140 would be required for that work.

141 The report shall be developed in collaboration with HealthierHere, Northwest
142 Health Law Advocates who authored the April 2018 report entitled "County-Based
143 Health Coverage for Adult Immigrants: A Proposal for Counties in Washington State,"
144 and other organizations that are involved with county healthcare issues.

145 The executive should file the report by June 30, 2019, in the form of a paper
146 original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original
147 and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the
148 lead staff for the health, housing and human services committee, or its successor.

149 P4 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

150 Of this appropriation, \$2,700,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the
151 executive transmits a report that provides additional information on the public health
152 approach to zero youth detention strategy and a motion that should acknowledge receipt
153 of the report and reference the subject matter, the proviso's ordinance, ordinance section
154 and proviso number in both the title and body of the motion and a motion acknowledging
155 receipt of the report is passed by the council.

156 The report shall include, but not be limited to:

157 A. An explanation of how the public health approach to zero youth detention
158 strategy connects with the best starts for kids's stopping the school-to-prison pipeline
159 strategy. The explanation should include, but not be limited to, coordination of the two
160 strategies, areas of overlap between the two strategies particularly with regards to
161 community organizations that will be contracting with the county on implementing both
162 strategies and the individuals that would benefit from the two strategies;

163 B. Evaluation of past successful gang intervention programs in the county such as
164 the Seattle Team for Youth and Safety Mop and determine how the principles and
165 strategies of these past programs can be incorporated into the public health approach to
166 zero youth detention strategy;

167 C. Additional information on the public health approach to zero youth detention
168 strategy that have been developed since the adoption of the this ordinance, including, but
169 not limited to, detailed information on the one million dollars proposed to expand
170 community support related to electronic home monitoring.

171 The executive must file the plan and a motion required by this proviso by March
172 29, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the
173 council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all
174 councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the law and justice
175 committee, or its successor."
