Members of the Budget and Fiscal Management Committee:

My name is Cherish Hart and I am the Vice President of Health Strategies for the American Heart Association of Puget Sound. I am also a 16-year resident of King County.

The American Heart Association supports measures that address health disparities in the areas of heart disease, stroke and related risk factors. In my role, I work to improve the health of King County residents through implementing strategies that ultimately lead to fulfillment of our mission to be a relentless force for longer healthier lives. Locally our impact priorities are to support sustainable change in youth tobacco and vaping prevention and cessation, improved blood pressure rates, and nutrition security.

We applaud King County's efforts to invest in food security and increase health care access for residents, especially among the Black, Indigenous, and People of Color community, by providing culturally appropriate foods and helping uninsured individuals enroll in health insurance. Ensuring that people have access to food that meets both their nutritional and cultural needs is imperative to building health equity and the need is currently high. In fact, the Washington State Food Security Survey released in October 2020 found that respondents of color were more than 1.5 times as likely to be food insecure as white respondents and 40% of respondents overall reported that their diets worsened during the pandemic. Increased funding for culturally relevant foods that have high nutritional value will help bridge that. In fact, Northwest Harvest recently held listening sessions to understand more about use of food banks and barriers perceived by various groups. Across race and ethnicities participants shared that they would be MORE likely to access services if there was better quality of food, more choices, and more foods that meet cultural and religious needs.

Thank you for your commitment to promoting equitable social, economic, and environmental conditions so that King County residents can achieve optimal health and well-being.

Good Morning Budget Chair Kohl-Welles and Council Members,

The Low Income Housing Institute is testifying today alongside community members, people experiencing homelessness, and faith leaders to request King County's support to fund a rapid expansion of our non-congregate Tiny House Villages. We are proposing that \$8.8 million in federal ARPA funds be prioritized to stand up four new villages in North, East, and South King County.

LIHI currently operates or supports 13 villages serving people and families experiencing homelessness in Seattle, Tacoma, and Olympia. These serve as a stepping stone from homelessness to long-term housing with a much higher rate of exits to long-term housing compared to other forms of shelter, but also are an ideal form of shelter to significantly reduce exposure to Covid-19 for some of the most vulnerable people in our county. Tiny houses are not only quality constructed, heated and insulated, but non-congregate shelter that allow residents dignity, privacy and the ability to socially distance by not having to share air or space with others. We know this service is critical as we hear reports from Governor Inslee of a possible fourth wave of Covid-19 cases rising in the coming months. We have a standing partnership with Public Health to make sure vaccinations are available at all our village locations.

We're excited to share that we're just weeks out from opening the first tiny house village in King County outside Seattle sponsored by the Word of God Church on their land in Skyway. We greatly appreciate the support and leadership from Councilmember Zahilay and his staff, the Skyway Coalition, and other Skyway neighbors and businesses who have been crucial partners in this effort. This is one of many powerful partnerships LIHI has formed with faith organizations for tiny house villages.

Today we are joined by Pastor Henry Jenkins with the Miracle Temple Church who is interested in sponsoring a Tiny House Village on their land in Tukwila in Councilmember McDermott's district. With the support of the County, we have the ability to stand up this village and three others quickly to help people exit homelessness and significantly reduce their exposure to Covid-19 in our collective effort to solve the dual crises of homelessness and the pandemic. This would immediately take 200 homeless people off the street and connect them to services and eventually permanent housing.



TINY HOUSE VILLAGES

In partnership with the City of Seattle, City of Olympia, and partners throughout the state of Washington, the Low Income Housing Institute is now one of the largest providers of Tiny Houses in the nation, ensuring that people's experience in homelessness is safe, dignified and as brief as possible.



THE PROBLEM

In the state of Washington, there are currently more than 40,000 homeless individuals living in either shelters or in the outdoors. More than 7,000 of these individuals are part of a family with children (WA Dept. of Commerce). In King County, the 2019 point-in-time count documented that there were 5,288. While Veteran homelessness and chronic homelessness have gone down in recent years, the current stock of shelters and affordable housing cannot keep up with the dramatic increase in the number of homeless people.







OUR SOLUTION

In 2015, LIHI started building Tiny House Villages as a response to the homeless crisis and as a replacement for tents. Tiny houses offer tremendous benefits over tents – they are safe, weatherproof and lockable – and the Tiny House Villages allow residents to reclaim their dignity and get on a path to permanent housing, employment and connection to supportive services.



OUR COMMUNITIES

There are currently 9 Tiny House Villages in Seattle and 1 in Olympia. Each village has hygiene facilities, utility access, and a supportive neighboring community that is actively engaged in the success of the residents. LIHI partners with residents at 6 villages in co-operative, democratic management of the communities. These 10 villages support over 1000 residents annually.





THE HOUSES

By collaborating with volunteers, building trade organizations, and non-profits, tiny houses offer a grassroots solution to a growing program. A tiny house is approximately 8' x 12' and materials cost \$2,500. All tiny houses are safe, sturdy structures that help protect homeless individuals and families who are faced with sleeping on the streets in unsheltered and unsafe conditions.



AMENITIES - MORE THAN HOUSES

Each house has electricity, overhead light, insulation, and a heater. Each village has a kitchen, bathroom facilities, offices for onsite case managers, ample storage, and a check in house for security.







OUR SUCCESSES

Through our supportive services and housing resources, residents of the Tiny House Villages have experienced success in moving out of homelessness. We have helped hundreds of village residents move into permanent housing and find employment.



COMMUNITY, VOLUNTEERS & THE FUTURE

Working with our self-management and advocacy partners such as Camp Second Chance and Interbay Safe Harbor, village residents participate in community meetings, do daily litter patrols, and serve as eyes on the street in the neighborhood. Volunteers, neighbors, and donors play a huge part in building the houses, setting up the villages, and providing food and supplies. The City of Seattle is a major partner, providing land and operating funds. Together we are finding new ways to help people in crisis. We continue to forge new partnerships and are working to open more villages in the near future.
