Proposed Resolution FCD 2021-07: A resolution relating to the operations and finances of the King County Flood Control Zone District; authorizing the expenditure of District funds for projects and activities in Water Resource Inventory Areas 7 (Snoqualmie Watershed portion) 8, 9 and 10 (King County portion).

The Water Resource Inventory Areas ("WRIA") grant program is in its ninth year. After the adoption of FCD Resolution 2020-05 that doubled the 2020 funding for WRIAs grant program, the Flood Control District provided \$9,838,254 in funding for projects and activities in WRIA 7 (Snoqualmie Watershed portion), 8, 9, and 10 (King County portion).

The WRIA staff and committee members reviewed the projects for eligibility and visited project sites for a technical review. Each WRIA submitted its proposal for projects to receive funding of water quality and water resources and habitat restoration projects and activities as follows:

1. WRIA 7 (Snoqualmie Watershed portion): \$2,015,872¹;
2. WRIA 8: \$3,686,542;
3. WRIA 9: \$3,711,116; and
4. WRIA 10 (King County portion): \$502,763.

Adoption of this proposed resolution does not change the 2021 budget; it simply details where the already allocated grant funds are going.

Cooperative Watershed Management Grants in WRIA 10

Dear Chair Upthegrove,

The Puyallup & Chambers Watersheds Salmon Recovery Citizens' Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Group would like to thank you for your ongoing support for salmon habitat restoration and monitoring in the Puyallup-White River Watershed through the King County Cooperative Watershed Management (CWM) Grant Program. We would like to express our gratitude for the additional funding that is being directed to the Watershed.

We are pleased to provide these funding recommendations for the 2021 CWM Grant Round. The projects on the list have been vetted according to King County's CWM Program rules and procedures. The recommended projects were evaluated and prioritized by our Citizens' Advisory Committee and our Technical Advisory Group. Project ranking follows criteria in the Puyallup & Chambers Salmon Habitat Protection and Restoration Strategy, which includes benefit to salmon, certainty of success, fit to strategy, and social, economic, and multi-benefit criteria.

Through the 2021 CWM Program, the Puyallup-White Watershed (WRIA 10) is allocated \$502,763 to fund high priority salmon recovery projects and programs. We received three proposals requesting a combined \$1,074,914, exceeding our available funds by \$575,151.

These grant funds help implement some of the highest priority salmon recovery actions called for in the Salmon Habitat Protection and Restoration Strategy. This year we are thrilled to again be supporting a proposal that will bridge one of our important monitoring efforts – a juvenile outmigration study on the White River proposed by the Puyallup Tribe of Indians. We recommend fully granting the project sponsor's requested allocation of \$168,914. These juvenile outmigration data are important to the watershed and the region, and we are very grateful for this flexible funding source that allows us to accomplish this essential work.

We recommend that the remaining \$333,849 go to the City of Enumclaw; they have requested \$480,000 for the Boise Creek Restoration project at the City of Enumclaw Golf Course property. As you may recall, CWM funding went to project design in 2020, and now the project proponents will complete design, permitting and construction of their proposed project to relocate the channel of Boise Creek and daylight Chappel Creek, which will improve salmon habitat while also reducing water temperatures.

The South Puget Sound Salmon Enhancement Group has requested \$426,000 to partially fund the next phase of road removal, floodplain reconnection and placement of large wood in the Greenwater River. This is an excellent project and also a high priority for salmon recovery; we would have been delighted to fund this project as well.

These 2021 CWM funds help further The Puyallup and Chambers Watersheds Salmon Recovery Lead Entity’s efforts to help the recovery of self-sustaining salmon populations in Puget Sound by supporting projects and programs in the White River and its tributaries. Rivers and streams in the Puyallup-White Watershed support threatened Chinook, steelhead and bull trout, as well as non-ESA listed but critical species. In addition, the White River and its tributaries support the only run of Spring Chinook in South Puget Sound. According to the National Marine Fisheries Service, White River Spring Chinook are one of only five hatchery stocks that are considered essential to the recovery of Puget Sound Chinook salmon, making recovery efforts in this watershed of paramount importance.

We sincerely appreciate the King County Flood Control District’s support of high-priority salmon recovery projects and programs in WRIA 10. We are also very excited about receiving these three strong applications for high-priority projects in our Watersheds.



RE: WRIA 8 Salmon Recovery Council Funding Recommendations for 2021 Cooperative Watershed Management Grants

Dear Chair Upthegrove:

On behalf of the Lake Washington/Cedar/Sammamish Watershed (WRIA 8) Salmon Recovery Council, thank you to the King County Flood Control District for supporting important salmon recovery work through the Cooperative Watershed Management (CWM) Grant Program. The WRIA 8 partnership is comprised of 28 local governments, businesses, community groups, concerned citizens, and state and federal agencies who have been working since 2000 to recover Chinook salmon and improve the health of our watershed.

Please find attached the WRIA 8 Salmon Recovery Council's approved funding recommendations for the 2021 CWM Grant Program. We recommend awards for 27 salmon recovery projects and programs, obligating the entire amount available to us in 2021--\$3,686,543. All proposals are consistent with CWM program rules and procedures and were evaluated and prioritized by the WRIA 8 Project Subcommittee, and funding recommendations were approved by the WRIA 8 Salmon Recovery Council on May 20.

The Flood Control District's decision last year to increase funding for the CWM program helped reveal the demand for salmon recovery resources in our watershed. In this year's grant cycle, we received 37 applications—far more than in any previous cycle. Not only are we now able to fund a larger number of proposals, but we are also able to contribute larger amounts to individual projects, thus boosting our sponsors' ability to implement high priority activities sooner than would otherwise be possible. We greatly appreciate the Flood Control District's commitment the CWM Grant Program and look forward to the great work that will be accomplished with 2021 grant funds.

RE: Water Resource Inventory Area 9 Forum of Local Governments Funding Recommendations for Cooperative Watershed Management Grants

Dear Chair Upthegrove and Flood Control District Board members,

The Green/Duwamish and Central Puget Sound (WRIA 9) Watershed Ecosystem Forum (WEF) unanimously approved the presented list of funding recommendations for the 2021 Cooperative Watershed Management Grant (CWM) Program at its May 13, 2021 meeting. The projects implement priority elements of the WRIA 9 Salmon Habitat Plan and meet a high level of technical rigor.

The WRIA 9 allocation of \$3,711,116 from the Flood Control District provides critical funding for twelve high priority capital projects, including NE Auburn Creek (King County), Flaming Geyser State Park Restoration (King County), and Gilliam Creek Culvert Removal (City of Tukwila). These capital projects will enhance riparian vegetation, increase fish access to vital off-channel habitat, restore and reconnect floodplains, and create nearshore rearing habitat for Chinook and other salmonids.

In addition to these high priority capital projects, CWM funding will support nine community-based revegetation projects (Regreen the Green); ten Stewardship, Engagement and Learning (SEaL) projects and programs; and four Monitoring and Research projects that inform effective and strategic implementation of the updated Salmon Habitat Plan. We are excited to bring in new partnerships and broaden the impact of CWM funding through new funding opportunities, specifically focusing on achieving multiple benefits within each funded project.

Combined with leveraged funding, partners will be investing approximately \$11 million in funding from federal, state, and local sources to implement WRIA 9 salmon recovery priorities.

Increased support from the District has allowed our partners to amplify and accelerate their work on behalf of ecosystem restoration and salmon recovery in the Green/Duwamish watershed. These investments build community, create equitable jobs, protect critical habitat and infrastructure, and promote environmental stewardship.

Dear Chair Upthegrove,

On behalf of the Snoqualmie Watershed Forum (Forum), I would like to express my gratitude to the King County Flood Control District (FCD) for supporting our important regional salmon recovery work. The Forum is a partnership of elected officials, citizens and representatives from conservation organizations supporting salmon recovery and ecological health in the Snoqualmie and South Fork Skykomish Watersheds (spanning the King County portion of Water Resource Inventory Area 7). Member governments include King County, the Snoqualmie Tribe, Tulalip Tribes, the cities of Duvall, Carnation, North Bend and Snoqualmie, and the town of Skykomish.

I would like to present the attached Forum funding recommendations for the 2021 Cooperative Watershed Management (CWM) Grant Program funded through the FCD. The projects and programs on the list have been vetted according to King County's CWM Grant Program rules and procedures. The recommended projects and programs have also been thoroughly reviewed and prioritized by our local Project Review Committee and approved by the Forum on May 19, 2021.

Through the 2021 CWM Grant Program, the Forum received \$1,937,833 to allocate to high-priority salmon recovery projects and programs. In this grant round, we received 29 proposals for a total request of over \$3.4 million, resulting in an approximately \$1.4 M funding shortfall.

We recommend funding for 19 of the 29 proposals received. These grant funds help implement critical salmon recovery priorities called for in the Snohomish River Basin Salmon Conservation Plan, including habitat restoration projects, watershed education and sustaining critical capital project coordination activities. Many of our high priority salmon restoration projects also provide multiple benefits, including flood hazard risk reduction, water quality improvements and landowner stewardship.

As you know, our efforts in WRIA 7 are part of the overall regional effort to recover threatened Puget Sound Chinook salmon as well as other salmonids, and we have been engaged with our partners in that effort for over 20 years. These CWM funds are a crucial component of our habitat acquisition and restoration funding that allows us to move important salmon recovery projects forward.
